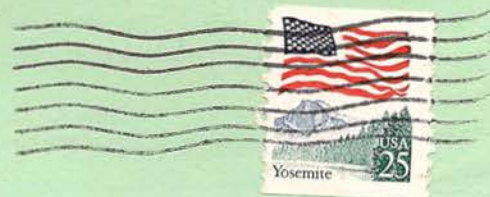

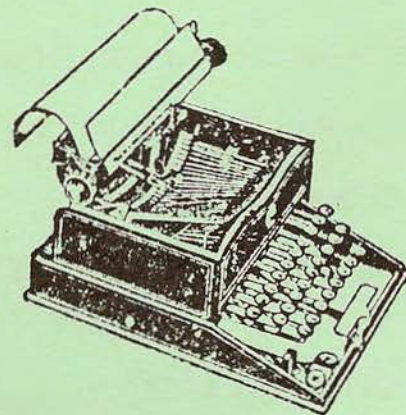

Hi Lois - Sorry to have missed seeing you and the other Dexterites at the Annual Meeting, but I was "Making Hay While the Sun Shone".

I wanted to make a general announcement that this will be my third year of displaying my Dexters at the Oregon State Fair. (12 Head each year was the requirement.) Next year, we can have a class - with Judging, Ribbons and Cash awards. However, next year we will need to enter 35 animals with a minimum of 5 exhibitors. The fair is open to exhibitors from out of state, and I'm sure Canadian entries would be welcome too.

The Oregon State Fair is a large, clean, well attended fair, and held the last of August. I'll be working with the fair, and get more information to you as it becomes available. We will probably want to suggest suitable judges - so folks might want to forward names of judges who would be considered "qualified Dexter judges".

In addition, I will be at the Western Washington Fair (Puyallup) Sept 19th thru 23rd with Dexters. Anyone who would like to come and "talk Dexter" to the public are welcome to do so. It's a good chance to meet the public, pass out business cards, etc. There is a possibility you could display an animal, but we are limited to 6 animals, and they must be broke to lead and handle easily - although there is no showing in the ring or awards. Annual Meeting
American Dexter Cattle Association
Minutes
June 23, 1990

The meeting was called to order by President Phil Martz at 9:00 a.m. at the Ramada Inn in Ft. Collins, Colorado. Those present were Dave Archer, Rodney Birdsell, Bonnie Boudreau, George & Pearl Branson, Fred Chesterley, Fred & Evelyn Colclough, Carol Davidson, Rosemary & Dean Fleharty, Jack Goodman, Felicia Hall, Jim & Lois Johnson, Harry & Billie Julian, Frank & Neisha Klein, Phil Martz, Jim & Jeanne Mitchell, Pat & Linda Mitchell, Don & Pat Piehota, Shep & Mary Springer, Paul Taylor, and Sandi Thomas.

It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Springer) and approved to accept the minutes from the 1989 annual meeting.

It was moved (Julian), seconded (Johnson) and approved to accept the financial statement for 1989.

Report on Standards Committee (members, D. Fleharty, Hays, Crapp, Boudreau and Thomas). Thomas reported that a worksheet was sent to all committee members. The responses to the questionnaire (worksheet) were read to the members. Do the members want to change the standards? It was moved (Springer), seconded (Johnson) and approved that this information be sent back to the Standards Committee. Any input for changes to the standards should be sent in written form to the chair of the Standards Committee.

Exotic Sales Committee. Springer read his ideas for sponsoring such a sale. It was moved (Mitchell), seconded (Chesterley) that as an Association we do not sanction any sales. The motion was amended to read that ADCA does not sanction any non-ADCA sales. The motion as amended was approved with one opposition.

It was moved (Piehota), seconded (Archer) that we have an ongoing announcement in the "Bulletin" that ADCA does not sanction any exotic sales. The motion was amended by Chesterley that ADCA put an announcement in the Rare Breeds Journal and Hornsmatch. The motion was approved as amended.

It was discussed that having an information sheet (using a standardized form) available for A.I. bulls would be helpful. This would allow the ADCA to get information to the average owner on what information he should gather on a bull he plans to have available for A.I.

It was moved (Julian), seconded (Fleharty) that ADCA have a form that can be given to each member on what needs to be done to accumulate the information on bulls to be put in the A.I. program. The motion was amended to have Shep Springer contact a university or ABS to determine what requirements are needed for A.I. bulls. The motion was approved as amended with four oppositions.

By-Laws Committee--Jim Mitchell. All sections of the By-Laws that were sent to members to vote on were passed. A new copy of the By-Laws will be sent to all members.

A question was raised if Directors should be required to attend annual meetings except in the case of illness or death in the family. It was moved (Piehota), seconded (Chesterley) that if a Director is not present at the annual meeting and the President and the other members of the Board do not find the reason for absence acceptable, his constituents or members of his region are to be notified and determine if a new Board member should be elected. The motion was amended to read that Board members be required to attend annual meetings unless a valid reason is received by the President. The motion was approved with one opposition.

The President conveyed a special thank you to Lois Johnson for doing an outstanding job on the "Bulletin." All members are encouraged to send constructive material to Lois for the "Bulletin."

Advertising Committee--Rosemary Fleharty. Advertising was placed in both Dairy Goat Journal and Hoard's Dairyman. Both ads have been successful to date bringing in numerous inquiries. It was moved (Piehota),

seconded (Chesterley) that the advertising budget be 20-25% of the gross income of the ADCA and that ads not be less than \$1,000. The motion was amended to read that several of the ads be at least \$1,000. Following further discussion the motion was withdrawn.

Discussion was held on animals for sale. A suggestion was that an article be placed in the "Bulletin" encouraging members who have animals for sale to let their Regional Director know if they do not wish to place an ad in the "Bulletin."

It was moved (Fleharty), seconded (Boudreau) that the Board of Directors allocate a certain amount of money to Regional Directors for meeting expenses (advertising, postage, etc.) A question was raised if the ADCA should approve this type of expense. It was agreed that the Regional Director would apply for funds and then send justification to the secretary of how the funds were spent. The motion was approved.

The 1991 annual meeting will be held in Texas. Should the 1992 meeting be held in the New England states? It was moved (Thomas), seconded (Klein) and approved that the ADCA contact someone to host a meeting in the Southeast district for 1992.

The meeting was continued with NEW BUSINESS:

It was moved (L. Johnson), seconded (Boudreau) and approved that the Association have a business checkbook and a business deposit stamp. The secretary will take care of this request.

It was moved (Chesterley), seconded (Birdsell) that ADCA have a question and answer session at the annual meeting regarding A.I. bulls and their offspring. The motion failed.

It was moved (Piehota), seconded (Goodman) that individuals nominated as officers or Directors of the ADCA or assigned to committees have three years as a Dexter breeder/owner experience. The motion failed.

Fred Chesterley would like to encourage the Board of Directors to update the data processing system for the ADCA.

The registration of calves from heifers that are less than 18 months old was discussed. At present any calf from a heifer under 18 months of age is ineligible for registration. It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Davidson) and approved that ADCA change the registration that if there is documentary evidence to support that the animal is a purebred Dexter, it is eligible for registration, but that the Association **discourages** early breeding. This will be retroactive for animals born over the past three years. If there is a question about parentage, the Board may call for blood testing.

There is some question about the eligibility of calves bred from A.I. bulls registered only in the U.S. for registration in Canada. This information will be given to the Board for further discussion.

It was moved (Thomas), seconded (Davidson) and approved that the ADCA put together a job description for the members of the Board of Directors.

Nominations for Directors-at-large: Pat Mitchell, Sandi Thomas, Carol Davidson, Harry Julian. It was moved (J. Mitchell), seconded (Boudreau) and approved that nominations cease. Sandi Thomas and Pat Mitchell were elected as Directors-at-large for Sunday's Board meeting.

An offering was made to host the meeting for 1993 in Michigan.

The Board will address EX animals.

It was moved (Archer), seconded (Piehota) and approved to adjourn the meeting.

Board of Directors Meeting
American Dexter Cattle Association
June 24, 1990

The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the American Dexter Cattle Association was called to order by President Phil Martz at 8:00 a.m. in the Ramada Inn, Ft. Collins, Colorado. Those present were: Bonnie Boudreau, George Branson, Rosemary Fleharty, Jack Goodman, Jim Johnson, Phil Martz, Jim Mitchell, Pat Mitchell, Shep Springer, Paul Taylor, and Sandi Thomas.

A correction was made to the 1989 minutes to strike the sentence "It would require 1,000 blood samples at a certain lab before a test could be run to determine if an animal was a Dexter." Regarding a request from the Missouri Dexter Breeders Association for \$100 for advertising in 1989. Rosemary Fleharty reported that she had no response from the other members of the Advertising Committee so no decision could be made. It was the consensus of the Board that \$100 should be given to the MDBA for advertising.

It was moved (P. Mitchell), seconded (J. Mitchell) and approved to accept the minutes with the above correction.

The financial statement for 1989 was reviewed. A suggestion was made by the Board to no longer show postage received for mailing of books as an income. It will be shown as a part of the income of the book sales. It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Taylor) and approved to accept the financial reports (both current and projected).

Embryo transfer rules were discussed. It was moved (J. Mitchell), seconded (Boudreau) and approved to combine the A.I. committee with work to be done on embryo transfer rules and have Sandi Thomas and Shep Springer co-chair this committee. It was agreed to accept the Holstein regulations on E.T. Springer and Thomas will prepare a report to be sent to the President in 60 days. This report will be sent to the members of the Board for approval.

It was moved (Johnson), seconded (P. Mitchell) and approved to combine all three offices of Registrar, Secretary and Treasurer under one individual.

President Martz will draw up job descriptions for directors. It was the consensus of the Board to inform directors of the importance of having Regional meetings each year.

Board members agreed that it is important for the Editor of the "Bulletin" to have assistance from all Board members as well as all members of the ADCA and to get the items in by the deadline.

It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Taylor) and approved to accept Jim Mitchell's proposal of paying the registrar \$3 for each registration completed and \$2 for each transfer completed.

It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Boudreau) and approved to pay \$2,000 for the secretarial work and \$500 for the treasurer work.

The secretary reported that a new user-friendly computer update as well as a computer with a 386 processor to process the many records involved would cost the ADCA approximately \$7,000. It was moved (Johnson), seconded (P. Mitchell), and approved that the Association spend the \$7,000 over a three-year period for the updated software and hardware.

It was moved (J. Mitchell), seconded (Boudreau) and approved to pay the Editor of the "Bulletin" \$125 per issue. This amount should be paid following the publication of each issue.

Expenditures for Regional Meetings was discussed. It was moved (Johnson), seconded (P. Mitchell) and approved that expenses of up to \$100 be authorized for Regional Directors to apply for postage, phone calls, etc. for Regional meetings. Bills for this must be submitted to the secretary. If there is a question on expenditures, it will be reviewed with the President.

The redistricting of regions was discussed. This redistricting would result in 13 regions as follows:

It was moved (J. Mitchell), seconded (Johnson) and approved to accept this redistricting effective January 1, 1991.

It was agreed that any suggestions on advertising should be sent to the Secretary.

It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Goodman) and approved that a letter of recognition be put in the "Bulletin" recognizing Shep and Mary Springer's work on the Annual Meeting.

It was moved (Johnson), seconded (J. Mitchell) and approved that ADCA adopt the proposal presented at the annual meeting regarding the registration of calves out of animals 18 months or younger. This motion was as follows: *It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Davidson) and approved that ADCA change the registration that if there is documentary evidence to support that the animal is a purebred Dexter, it is eligible for registration, but that the Association discourages early breeding. This will be retroactive for animals born over the past three years. If there is a question about parentage, the Board may call for blood testing.*

A discussion was held about the cost of placing advertising in the "Bulletin." Does the \$5 apply to animals *wanted* as well as *for sale*? It was the consensus of the Board that all ads should be paid for at the rate of \$5 regardless if animals are *wanted* or *for sale*.

Discussion was held on placing EX's on registration numbers of some animals. This was done only as an information item so that members would know that the parentage of an animal contained an "experimental" animal in the last five generations of its pedigree. A question was raised regarding the pedigree on Parndon Bullfinch. President Phil Martz will write the secretary of the English Dexter Society requesting the pedigree on Parndon Bullfinch.

Discussion was held on cross-bred animals even if by accidental breeding and if some members are truly determining if these cattle are true Dexters for registration purposes. It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Boudreau) and approved that if there is any question of the breed of an animal of being anything but a true Dexter, the Board can require that the animal(s) be blood tested at the owner's expense.

Committee appointments:

A.I. and Embryo Transfer - Shep Springer and Sandi Thomas

By-Laws - Jim Mitchell

Ethics - Will be handled by the Board

Advertising - Rosemary Fleharty will continue with suggestions from the Board

10 It was moved (Johnson), seconded (J. Mitchell) and approved to accept the motion from the annual meeting regarding exotic sales. The motion read as follows: *It was moved (Mitchell), seconded (Chesterley) that as an Association we do not sanction any sales. The motion was amended to read that ADCA does not sanction any non-ADCA sales. The motion as amended was approved with one opposition.*

Election of Officers: Jim Mitchell was chosen as Chairman of Elections. It was moved (Johnson), seconded (Goodman) to have officers remain as at present. The vote was unanimous.

It was agreed that there should be a Board phone conference in late November or early December. Any suggestions for an agenda for this phone conference should be sent to President Phil Martz no later than November 1. Because of the interference on the last conference call, it was felt perhaps it would be better to originate the call from the secretary in Missouri.

It was moved (J. Mitchell), seconded (Boudreau) and approved to adjourn the meeting.
