Message from the President

It was a hot time out there in Oklahoma! That's for sure. While perspiration dripped from the noses of both bovine and humankind, and large fans whirred some coolness into the barn, a very successful show and sale took place. Congratulations to the members of Region 6 for this wonderful event! All of their hard work paid off. Special accolades go to Joanie Storck, Region 6 Director, who was in charge of getting it done, which she did in fine form. Thank you from all of us who attended!

In this issue you'll find minutes of the meetings in Oklahoma as submitted by our Secretary, Rosemary Fleharty. I would encourage you to read these since they are the best source for the details of business that was conducted. For example, in response to the needs of members, some re-alignment of regions was done in addition to dividing Region 8.

Happily I can report that the ADCA is growing. The entries in our herdbook approximately double every decade: 1982—200 entries; 1992—465 entries; 2002—1,004 entries. We now can boast of nearly 750 memberships. Our grand total income as of 12/31/02 was \$110,231.05. It's no longer a few folks getting together once a year to figure out how to keep such a small organization going. Our task now appears to be how we can best respond to this growth and plan for our future.

I really feel that our discussions in Oklahoma responded positively to establishing direction and vision for where the ADCA is going. Dexters are a diverse breed and we certainly don't want to do anything to limit their marketability. Maintaining the integrity of the registry is always the paramount priority.

As Officers and Directors, we are often faced with new situations through which we try to navigate with common sense and integrity. We are making progress in establishing and protecting a framework for the future. The new Bylaws and the Rules and Regulations, along with careful planning, all took a great deal of time for

the Directors and Officers. As you will read in the minutes, a motion was passed at the Board meeting to begin the process of providing for the ADCA office in a business setting as opposed to in a home. It must be stressed that this in no way is a criticism of the fine work done by Rosemary Fleharty, who has been the backbone of the ADCA for many years. It simply seems prudent to plan for continued growth and long-term security of the registry. Now we welcome Dean Fleharty, Rosemary's husband, as a part-time employee as well. He has always served in a very supportive role. Now he will increase the number of hours that someone is available for phone calls as well as helping with a great deal of paperwork.

The newly revamped Bylaws included in this issue are important. Having a framework for how we conduct business and provide for our members and their cattle is vital for our continued success. Please read the Bylaws, consider them carefully, and vote on them. The officers and directors worked zealously on these in Oklahoma. Donna Martin, Director of Region 8, has taken the lead in reviewing both the Bylaws and the Rules and Regulations, which will follow in an upcoming issue of the Bulletin. Our thanks is extended to Donna for her fine work and diligence.

For the good of the order, I'd like to make a couple of suggestions about email. First, rather than risk not having an email opened or having it get confused with all of the fabulous offers for lotions and potions to enhance every aspect of our personal lives, we need to be sure that the subject line carries something cattle-related. I would, therefore, suggest that we're careful to include the letters "ADCA" or the word "Dexter" or even "cattle" in our emails. For obvious reasons, words like "semen" or "breeding" etc. might not make it through some

filtering systems. Second, I would just like to remind everyone that our association with other Dexter owners is related to cattle. I know that they are interested in Dexter cattle. I can perhaps infer that they are animal lovers in general. I would be remiss to consider them necessarily aligned with any political, religious, or personal opinions I might have about the world. Sending things out to everyone in an address book could create a false impression of the ADCA and discourage people from working with us. Please consider the topics carefully when sending messages to ADCA members. Clicking that button for everyone in the address book can have some hefty implications.

Please check the term expiration date for the director in your region. If it indicates that an election is taking place this year, do contact your director to see if there will be a vacancy. If there is a vacancy, consider running for the directorship in your region, or nominating someone you feel will well represent ADCA interests. We know there is a lot of talent out there in our membership.

I would call your attention to information on testing procedures for chondrodysplasia. The procedures and protocols seem to be in place. This should begin the process of identifying which animals are carriers and which are not. This test is in addition to those already in place for genetics and color, and will offer greater knowledge of Dexters. John Potter, Director in Region 14, is definitely our point person for information on testing.

I'd like to close with some especially positive thoughts:

Welcome to Sally Coad, the new director for Region 12, which is comprised of the New England States. She will be conducting a regional meeting at the NEHBC gathering in Pittsfield, MA during the last weekend of September. Good luck to Sally! She and her husband, Warren, have been tireless Dexter supporters.

One of the pieces of business accomplished by the Board to which I'd like to give special mention was the appointment of Marvin Johnson of Elkhart, Kansas, as

an honorary lifetime member of the ADCA. If you've ever seen Marvin at an ADCA event, then you know why this was so justified. He is always willing to lend a hand, has been one of the kindest individuals ever encountered, and has helped to promote Dexters throughout the United States. Marvin has logged thousands of miles on his truck and trailer lugging cattle to and fro. "Papa Johnson," as he is often called, has largely retired from the Dexter breeding and trucking, but his infectious smile reigned again at this year's AGM. Marvin, you have been an inspiration and a friend. From all of us, thank you for your efforts on behalf of Dexters. We wish you and your wife, DeLois, many years of happy retirement, and we're looking forward to seeing you at lots of AGM's in the future.

Secretary's Report

It was a very successful meeting in Oklahoma. A special thanks to all those who helped host our meeting this year. There were lots of good food, lots of cattle to see, and lots of heat (not fun).

Some upcoming changes will be implemented. As of mid-July, Dean is now taking on some of the duties such as registering and transferring cattle. He will also be available at least part-time during regular office hours 8:00 – 5:00 p.m. If not, the answering machine is still there and he will try to call you back as soon as he returns. I will continue to do the secretary things such as typing letters and helping keep new members up-to-date, etc. We are hoping that this additional time commitment will provide better and more service to our members.

We will be having a new on-line pedigree available (free of charge) on the web as soon as the middle of October. If no glitches are encountered, you will be able to look up past generations of cattle by number or name. The company is hard at work getting the system ready to roll. You will also be able to have photos of your cattle on the on-line pedigree. Mark Muir will be handling this part of the operation and as soon as we get all the information, we will let you know how to do this.

There will be a new \$10 rush fee for individuals wanting registration papers sooner than our normal two to three week turn-around time period. If you also want your papers sent priority rather than first class, there will also be a charge for this.

The Board of Directors voted to elimi-

nate the EX designation on registration papers. If you have papers with this designation and would like new papers, there will be a \$10 reprint fee. Anytime an animal is sold and transferred, a new paper is generated, so these extensions will no longer show up on the new reprinted papers.

If you are sending e-mails to the Association, please put a subject line of Dexter. With all the viruses occurring, we are all being very cautious about opening mail with attachments. Also, the high security I have on my computer keeps many of these e-mails from coming through, so if you don't get an answer to an e-mail, try again, or please call or send me a note via U.S. Postal Service.

The ADCA is considering putting all members' names on the ADCA website. The listing that is used for generating the membership book would be used. If you feel you would not like to have your name listed, please let either the ADCA office or Mark Muir know.

Don't forget to sign up to have your herd classified. A listing of dates when classifiers are in your area should be posted in this copy of the Bulletin.

Also, don't forget about the new DNA test for Chondrodysplasia in Dexter Cattle. If you have questions, please contact either the ADCA office or John Potter (Michigan) for further information. This is strictly a voluntary program. You will now be able to sell "tested" bulldogfree bulls. We are hoping many breeders will take the opportunity to participate.

By Laws Preface

Donna S. Martin, Chairperson, Rules/Regulations Committee

Following are the new Bylaws which were approved by the Board of Directors at the 2003 Annual General Meeting in Oklahoma. If approved, they will go into effect January 1, 2004. The Bylaws are the "framework" for the running of the organization. They have to be adopted by the general membership, and any changes have to be approved by the general membership through a voting process. As such they are not readily adaptable to ongoing, daily needs of the organization. That is where the Rules and Regulations come in. They are the "muscle," and provide the day-to-day procedural requirements of the organizational structure. The Rules and Regulations do not require the full membership vote, and thus can be modified on a timely basis to insure the smooth running of the organization, clarify issues on a timely basis, and provide definition to new areas

as they arise, such as new procedures for DNA testing, etc. The Bylaws say "what" needs to be done and the Rules say "how."

In this issue of the Bulletin, you are presented with the Bylaws. The Bylaws have to be adopted before the Rules and Regulations can go into effect. They have purposely been kept simple, with many references to the Rules and Regulations. This empowers the Rules and Regulations to define specifics on issues as they arise. The Rules and Regulations will be in the next issue of the Bulletin.

Following the Bylaws is a voting form for you to submit. Please take time to vote - this is your organization and your participation is needed. The ADCA has grown so much over the last few years. We are striving to be the best professional organization we can be in our structure, purpose, and our ability to serve the Dexter membership.

Ballot for the ByLaws

Please note this Ballot is to be used to vote on the newly-revised By-Laws included in this issue of the Bulletin. If approved, these By-Laws will take effect January 1, 2003. **This vote** is only for the By-Laws. The Rules and Regulations that will be sent out in the next issue of the Bulletin are voted on by the Board. They are reference notes and will not be voted on by the membership.

ADCA By Laws

Article I - Preamble Name/Location

The name of this Corporation shall be the American Dexter Cattle Association (ADCA). Its principle office location shall be in any city or county as designated by the Board of Directors.

1.1 Purpose

The ADCA is a not-for-profit corporation organized to develop, improve, and promote Dexter cattle as a breed. To this end, the ADCA's activities include, but are not limited to:

- (a) Recording and preserving the pedigrees of American Dexter Cattle while maintaining the integrity of the breed. This mandates the establishment and maintenance of a registry.
- (b) Providing services for its members which enhance and encourage Dexter cattle ownership.
 - (c) Supporting breed research.
- (d) Generating growth of ADCA membership.
- (e) Disseminating information and advertising the Dexter breed.
- (f) Providing and supervising a means of classifying Dexter cattle.

Article II - Governance 2.0 Officers

The Officers of the ADCA shall be the President and Vice-President.

These officers will be elected by the Board of Directors in a closed Executive Session as part of the Board Meeting which follows the Annual General Meeting (AGM). Included in the Executive Session are all of the Regional Directors present and the two Directors-At-Large. Excluded are the President and Vice-President. Nominations for officers can also come from the general membership by following the procedures listed in the Official Rules and Regulations.

The term of office begins as specified in the Official Rules and Regulations.

(a) President

The President shall perform the usual

duties associated with this office. The duties, requirements, and election procedures for the President are listed in the Official Rules and Regulations.

(b) Vice-President

The Vice-President shall serve in the absence or incapacity of the President as determined by the Board of Directors. The Vice-President shall, in addition, perform other tasks assigned by the President or Board of Directors.

The duties, requirements, and election procedures for the Vice-President as listed in the Official Rules and Regulations.

2.1 Executive Officers

Executive officers are non-voting positions serving on the Board of Directors.

Secretary and Treasurer

The positions of Secretary and Treasurer are employee (salaried) positions of the ADCA. They are reviewed by the Board of Directors annually and can serve indefinitely at the pleasure of the Board. The same person may hold the offices of Secretary and Treasurer.

The duties, requirements, and election procedures for the Secretary and Treasurer are listed in the Official Rules and Regulations.

In addition, the Secretary shall see that all orders and resolutions of the Board of Directors are carried into effect, and shall from time to time report to the Board of Directors all matters within the Secretary's knowledge which the interests of the corporation may require to be brought to its notice.

2.2 Fiscal Year of the ADCA

The fiscal year of the ADCA will be from January 1 to December 31.

2.3 Board of Directors

(a) The Board of Directors of the ADCA shall manage the affairs of the Corporation and be empowered to act for the Corporation. The Board of Directors shall consist

of all the Regional Directors, Officers, Executive Officers, and the immediate Past President. Additionally, at each Annual General Meeting (AGM), two Directors-at-Large will be elected from among those present to serve as Board members for the Board meeting which immediately follows that AGM. The members present at the AGM can nominate any member in good standing (preferably from Regions not represented at the AGM by a Director). Voting on the nominees will be held by secret ballot. The votes for any elected office of the ADCA shall be decided by a simple plurality of votes counted.

- (b) The Board of Directors will meet immediately before and immediately after each Annual General Meeting (AGM). The Directors present shall constitute a quorum.
- (c) Except when the Board is in Executive Session or considering personnel matters, ADCA members in good standing and invited guests may attend these meetings. They may not participate unless asked to do so by the Presiding Officer.
- (d) The immediate Past President will be a voting member of the Board of Directors.
- (e) Officers and Board of Directors serve without compensation.
- (f) A Special Board of Directors Meeting may be called by the President or by any four Regional Directors. The entire Board and the Officers must be notified in writing, by wire, or by email at least 30 days in advance. The notice must specify the agenda and no other matters may be considered.
- (g) Proxies are permitted and must be submitted in writing by the requesting Regional Director to the President no later than 24 hours prior to the beginning of the meeting.

2.4 Regional Directors

(a) In order to give members equal representation on the Board of Directors, North America is organized into Regions with approximately equal numbers of members in each region. The Regions will be re-examined as often as deemed neces-

sary by the Board of Directors for the purpose of realigning the number of Regions to reflect change in membership. Each Region will elect a Regional Director from among its members.

- **(b)** The duties, requirements, election procedures, and term of office are listed in the Official Rules and Regulations.
- (c) Regional Directors serve without compensation.

2.5 Staff Positions

The Board of Directors shall review and vote upon staff positions each year. The duties of each position shall be prescribed by the Board. These positions may be held jointly by an individual or in connection with another office of the ADCA. Compensation for these positions will be determined on a yearly basis by the Board.

Staff positions may include, but are not limited to, the positions of Registrar, Editor of the *Bulletin*, Advertising/Promotions Manager, and the ADCA webmaster.

Article III - Memberships

3.0 Qualifications

Any person, family, partnership, or corporation owning registered Dexter cattle or having an interest in Dexter cattle is eligible for membership in the ADCA. Members shall be admitted and retained in accordance with the Official Rules and Regulations. The rights, privileges, and obligations of the members are listed in the Official Rules and Regulations.

3.1 Membership Meetings

An Annual General Meeting (AGM) shall be held at a place and time designated by the Board of Directors. Members must be given written notice of the meeting at least 45 days in advance, either by publication in the *Dexter Bulletin* or by mail. Proxy procedures are outlined in the Official Rules and Regulations. Members in good standing, present in person or by proxy, shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV - Official Rules and Regulations

4.0 Codification

All matters not specifically covered by these Bylaws are the proper and appropriate business of the Official Rules and Regulations. These shall be codified, enumerated, and published annually.

4.1 Precedents

The Official Rules and Regulations shall consist of precedents previously established, actions recommended to the Board by the membership at the Annual General Meeting (AGM), and actions taken by the Board of Directors at their annual and special meetings.

4.2 Referendums

At its discretion, the Board of Directors may ask for a referendum by the membership on specific items. The final decision on the referendum will be made based on a simple plurality of votes received within the time specified.

Article V - Miscellaneous

5.0 Insurance

The ADCA shall carry liability insurance which will indemnify its Officers, Regional Directors, Executive Officers, and member serving in official capacities, for their actions on behalf of the ADCA.

5.1 Special Expenditures

The Board of Directors (except for specified Staff Positions) serve without compensation. However, for special expenses, and when it is fiscally prudent, the Board may allocate a sum to a Regional Director, an Officer, or a Member acting officially for the ADCA.

Article VI - ByLaw Amendments

6.0 Procedure

Amending these ByLaws is a five-part process. The proposed amendment shall be processed as follows:

- (a) Submitted to the President as an agenda item at least 60 days before the Annual General Meeting (AGM) and distributed with the notice of the meeting.
- **(b)** Discussed as new business at the Annual General Meeting (AGM).
- (c) Approved by a majority at the following meeting of the Board of Directors.
- (d) Submitted to the general membership at its entirety. There will be a time limit of 30 days for response to the proposed revision.
- **(e)** Approved by 3/4 of the responding membership.

2004 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The 2004 ADCA AGM will be Friday July 16 & Saturday July 17, 2004 in Meadville, PA. It is located 1 hour south of Erie and 2 hours north of Pittsburgh, PA along Interstate 79. There are camp sites with showers at fairground and several motels in the area. Contact Mark Muir for additional information.

Deadlines





What Happened at the 2003 AGM, Show and Sale?

This year, Region 6 hosted the ADCA meetings, educational events, show and sale. For any of you who have not had an opportunity to put on one of these events, you don't know what you are missing. Region 6 worked on this for several years and even did a trial run last year.

Board Meetings: President Kathy Smith gathered the Board members on Thursday to begin the grueling task of working through a new set of By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, unfinished business, the agenda for the AGM, and countless other items of business. Donna Martin had worked on the revision of the By-Laws and Rules and Regulations for the previous two years and she has to be congratulated for a super job. Even so, it took the Board long hours to fine-tune the final documents that will appear for membership approval.

The ADCA holds a Board meeting to approve the agenda for the AGM, holds the general membership meeting, and then the Board meets again the following day to finish work that was referred to the it during the general meeting.

Educational Program: The educational program was well-attended this year and the topics were very pertinent to the Dexter breed. John Potter gave an interactive presentation on the inheritance of color in Dexter cattle that gave everyone an opportunity to visualize what happens with the various combinations of color genetics. Dr. Fredrick Ray from Oklahoma State University gave the final report on the Dexter Cattle Feedout Program that was conducted last year. If you are wondering how Dexters perform in the feedlot and on the rail, take a look at this summary. It is full of very interesting data that you can use to answer questions about our breed. Those present with questions about mineral nutrition and general animal health were treated to a very informative talk on those subjects.

Leonard Johnson and David Kendall from the Brown Swiss Association were there to show us how the Dexter cattle classification system works on a live animal. Mr. Johnson is in charge of all of the classifiers that classify our herds, so it was good to hear from him. These two gentlemen also served as judges for the show on Saturday.

Show and Sale: Although there is a Show and Sale Report elsewhere in the Bulletin, here are a few of the highlights. Over 70 cattle were entered in the show and over 40 animals went through the sale. This is the largest Dexter show and sale in recent history. There was also the largest crowd there to witness these events that anyone can remember. It was obvious that the committee that worked on this event did their homework as far as publicity was concerned. There were cattle there from Arkansas, California, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Oregon. The weather was red hot, but so was the sale. The quality of animals was very high and both the established and new buyers appreciated that. They took home a record number of Dexter cattle and were happy to be able to find such a large and good selection to pick from.

Video Show: Even though some breeders brought their animals more than 2,000 miles to the Show and Sale, others were not able to make the trip, so they were able to compete via the Video Show. This is an event that takes place each year, and it is a lot of fun. This year, the state winning FFA livestock judging team from Perkins, Oklahoma served as judges for the video show. We got started using FFA judges last year in Oregon and thought that it was such a success, we would do it again. It is a sure way of getting a totally unbiased opinion of the cattle and to expose youth to our breed at the same time. The results of the Video Show will appear elsewhere in the Bulletin.

AGM: Immediately after the Show and Sale, the AGM was held in an air-conditioned hall that was a comfort to all. The Minutes of this and the Board meeting will be mailed to you, perhaps before you get the Bulletin. Each of the committees gives a report and this stimulated a lot of good discussion. The Show and Sale Committee discussed proposed show guidelines and the members made several suggestions to help the committee in their task. It was pointed out that the rules for the annual ADCA Show and Sale would not be required of all shows and sales where Dexters are taken. The Classification Committee gave a summary of the number of herds that had been classified since the beginning of the new program. They also asked if owners were willing to share the information anonymously to generate data that could be used to create a breed profile. The committee is working on an overall herd report on each herd that is classified. The owner can use that to help in their selection program in the future. The Science Committee announced that the first DNA samples had been run by Agrigenomics in Illinois for the Chondrodysplasia (bulldog) gene in Dexter cattle. The committee suggested that this will allow Dexter owners to stop concentrating on leg length as a means of determining whether or not an animal is a carrier. Rather, they will be able to breed the stature of cattle they like and use the DNA test to verify their freedom from the gene. The committee is working to develop the proper forms and a kit to submit blood, semen, or hair samples for analysis. Agrigenomics will develop a reporting form that can be used to verify test results for A.I. or sale purposes. It was also announced during the meeting that the ADCA will host the World Dexter Congress in 2006. This will be a huge undertaking and a committee was set up to begin work on this event. Cooperating organizations, locations, sponsors, and speakers are being considered at this time. The 2004 annual meeting will be held in **Pennsylvania** and the educational theme will be "Grass-Fed Dexters." Mark

Muir and company is deep into the plans for this event. The 2005 meeting may take us to the South to a location yet to be determined.

The Banquet: The Saturday evening banquet was also held in the airconditioned meeting hall where the food was great and the attendees chatty. This was a great venue for present and future Dexter owners to exchange ideas. Rosemary Fleharty and Wes Patton gave a report on the World Dexter Congress they attended in Australia last October. Wes showed pictures of the national Dexter show the Australians held and the Dexter farms he and his wife were able to visit while they were there. He also showed pictures of the tough conditions in most of that country because of severe drought. The evening was finished by a critique of the video show by the FFA livestock team. Although they were somewhat tentative at first, their Southwest humor soon captured everyone's attention.

Sunday Board Meeting: The Sunday Board meeting resulted in the approval of a plan to hire Dean Fleharty on a part-time basis to assist Rosemary in the operation of the ADCA office. The volume of business has increased to the point that the organization will begin to seek other associations to transition to over the next few years. In the meantime, the Flehartys will carry the load. The Officers will remain the same for the coming year, as will the Bulletin editor, website coordinator, and advertising agent.

Looking back over the four eventpacked days spent at this year's event, a tremendous amount was accomplished for the Dexter breed and for all of us who enjoy them so much.



Bos Dexterus Undocumentus: A Cautionary Tale

Like many people getting their first Dexters, I had tried and tried to locate animals for many months, suffering disappointments in the search which only whetted my desire for Dexters. Finally, two lovely cows and their daughters made the trek from Montana to Colorado, arriving the night before Thanksgiving. They had lost their owner in an accident, but the sheaf of papers which accompanied them gave neither their "heir" owner nor me any reason to think that transfers and registrations would be a problem. Unfortunately, two complete Dexter novices should not be allowed to make such judgments!

Once the initial euphoria (*I have Dexters!*) subsided, I finally began to plow through the paperwork which had come with the cows to start the transfer process. And kept on plowing until it became obvious that I had no certificates of registration and no transfer forms. Hmmm, beginning to look like a problem.

Fortunately, at this point I contacted the all-knowing Rosemary Fleharty, ADCA Secretary, with a plea for help. Having digested the bad news -- "You have grade cattle" -- I had a decision to make: either sell/slaughter them and start over, or try to find out their true identities. Option #2 won out, and the search for documents continues, with the help of several kind ADCA members in our area.

Now the "cautionary" part of the tale. As a show dog fancier and breeder, I'm familiar with registration procedures for dogs. Somehow, though, I just never equated "dog" and "cow" when thinking of registration requirements. Also, I had searched for so long for some Dexters that I wasn't inclined to scrutinize the paperwork which came with the cows closely enough. Actually having them at last seemed like such a miracle that I was sure (or hoped) paperwork would be trivial. Trust me, it isn't.

I hope this registration nightmare will finally be happily resolved, but one thing is for sure, any animal I buy, breed or sell from now on will be *Bos Dexterus Documentus!*



Advertising — Mark Muir — ads are placed regularly in a variety of publications. Additional advertising is done in the area where the National Show & Sale and Annual Meeting are held.

Website — Mark Muir — the question was raised if everyone would like to have his or her name and address on the web with phone number. A name could either be added or removed at the breeder's request. A notice will be placed in the Bulletin asking members if they want their name placed on the web. The membership book listing could be used as the reference to put individuals on the web.

Science Committee — Wes Patton — DNA test for bulldog gene. The technology was sold to Agrigenomics in Illinois and Dr. Jon Beever is the professor who heads up the program. Information on sending samples was included in the packets distributed at the meeting. Blood tests are available; the lab can also do semen. Dr. Beever indicated that instructions for collecting hair for the DNA test should be available shortly. A suggestion was that genetic testing for tenderness should be an item for the Science Committee. Any volunteers for the Committee—contact Wes Patton.

Finance — John Foley — The ADCA is going to refine the budget process.

Genetics — John Potter — Information for color testing is available in the membership book. DNA genotyping is now required for bulls—in the past the ADCA used a blood type on file with the Association. ImmGen located in Texas does this test. Genetics Vision in Wisconsin does the color test for red animals. The Directors agreed a chart should be made up on all three tests. John reminded members

doing DNA tests for bulls that hair or blood would give quicker results than semen.

Technology — Rosemary Fleharty gave information on an on-line pedigree program that the Board of Directors will be considering on Sunday.

By-Laws and Rules & Regulations — Donna Martin — Board of Directors spent a lot of time looking at a revised set of By-Laws and a new set of Rules and Regulations. Realignment is being considered for some regions.

Classification - Dean Fleharty - An on-site visit was done earlier in the year where the classifiers, Dean Fleharty and Mark Muir, attended and visited the herd at Keith Wertz's farm. The ADCA is now able to provide summaries on individual animals and working on herd summaries, and hopefully will to be able to provide that information shortly. If members are willing to have their scores used (anonymously), breed averages could be a possibility.

Show & Sale Committee Report — Joanie Storck and Sandi Thomas in absence of Pat Mitchell (Chair). There is still some discussion on grooming and pen classes. If the ADCA moves to a standard for clipping an animal, then members need to know the rules and a standard must be set for clipping Dexters. President Kathy Smith called the meeting to order at 8:00 a.m. at Best Western Stillwater.

Rules & Regulations & By-Laws will be sent to all Board members, Officers, and two Directors-at-Large. The vote must be 2/3 of the 16 to pass. Revisions should go to Donna Martin and the vote can be by email to Kathy Smith. The revisions are to be completed by August 1. Hard copies of revisions will be sent via U.S. Postal Service to all Directors, Officers, and Directors-at-Large.

For any "Rush" paperwork for fairs, etc. the cost will be an additional \$10 plus postage for special mailing beyond first class. The non-member fee will be twice the member fee. These fees will be included in the rules and regulations.

The reject fee will be \$10 upon the second rejection. It was noted that the secretary/ treasurer/ registrar does not receive any of these additional fees charged, including fees for reprinting of certificates. These additional fees go directly to the Association.

Rules and Regulations will take effect at the same time as the By-Laws, if approved - on January 1, 2004. The ballot to be mailed out needs to be clear that the vote is only on the By-Laws. Rules and Regulations are voted on by the Board and are reference notes and will not be voted on by the membership. By-Laws will go out in the September issue of the Bulletin and the Rules and Regulations will be mailed out in the next Bulletin following the vote on the By-Laws.

It was moved (Joanie Storck), seconded (John Potter), and approved that the Board and officers have one conference call a year, preferably in January.

It was moved (John Foley), seconded (John Potter), and approved to break up Region 8 based upon the approval of the By-Laws as presented by Donna Martin. North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Eastern Tennessee will compose one region and the other region will include Arkansas, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Central Tennessee. This second group of AR will constitute Region 15.

(Secretary's note—the on-line pedigree will be available October 15 due to some security concerns of the current web hoster.)

Show and Sale Rules and Regulations-Roger Lein will be added to the current committee consisting of Pat Mitchell, Mark Muir, Sandi Thomas, Dean Fleharty, John Foley, Joanie Storck, and Wes Patton. Any suggestions for changes should be sent to the committee. The AGM Show and Sale Rules and Regulations will apply only to AGM shows. It was agreed that the AGM should ban adhesives and sculpture clipping. It was moved (Mark Muir), seconded (John Foley), and approved that Wes Patton will make a video on ADCA approved grooming. The ADCA will reimburse Wes for the cost of making this video. A copy of the video will be sent to each Director, Officer, and member of the Show and Sale Committee.

A new committee was established—the AGM Guidelines Committee. Members will consist of Mark Muir (Chair), Kathy Smith, Joanie Storck, Wes Patton, Sandi Thomas, Bill Werner, and Chris Ricard.

2004 Budget — the Secretary/Treasurer will distribute quarterly reports related to the present budget to Board members. John Foley, Jim Smith, and Stan Cass will be members of the Budget Committee.

Carol Ann Traynor's daughter is a lawyer. Carol Ann will check with her regarding her interest in providing some legal advice for the ADCA.

It was moved (John Potter), seconded (Joanie Storck), and approved that Marvin Johnson be an (Honorary) Lifetime member. A note will be added to the next issue of the membership book listing the names of Lifetime members. A new category of membership will be added—Member Emeritus. This would be an active member that no longer has Dexters. The individual has had Dexters for five years and remained in good standing. This individual will receive full benefits including voting rights.

Shaun Lord, Carol Ann Traynor, and her daughter will put together an article on the Mandatory Beef Checkoff to be submitted to Patrice Lewis for the Bulletin.

Membership information needs to be more self-explanatory. It should be more user-friendly and should include the information that is crucial to the entrance of the Association. It should include an explanation of the necessity of the herd name for a member. All the forms sent to new members will be sent to the Directors. When Directors get letters on new members, they should contact the person and extend services to them. Each Director should develop a list of information that can be shared with new members specific to their Region. This information can also be shared with other Directors to assist others in creating information for their regions.

Name badges for ADCA members and Board members were discussed. A name badge could be sent out each year when dues are paid indicating the current year. This could be a simple badge that fits in a cover. A member would receive one cover and then just replacement badges each year. Mark Muir and Rosemary Fleharty will check on this.

Monitoring the Website—the ADCA will continue the links that are on the present website and continue to add additional links as deemed appropriate. In New Jersey and New York, it's time to start "buttoning up" for winter. Most wintering-over feeds are in, with the exception of field corn.

This year we are planting spelts in September and have given up on any more late alfalfa fields being baled. It's time for temporary fencing so the Dexters can clean up the hay fields, and later on the corn stubble.

New York exhibited three Dexter heifers at the Steuben County Fair. Diane and her daughter have shown cattle for a number of years and she reported the Dexters were a big hit, keeping her busy answering questions about the breed and "where can I get one?"

Often I receive calls from prospective buyers anxious to get a start with Dexters - they know all about them, have fallen in love with them, but cannot locate seed stock.

Region 10 Come to the 2004 AGM

Welcome to the Northeastern U.S. We are supposed to have a hard winter, according to the Farmer's almanac. The summer continued to provide us with excessive moisture. Making hay just meant you rolled the dice because the weathermen were not a reliable source of information. Sometimes I think a prerequisite to become a weather forecaster should be making quality hay for one season in the area where they want a position. Please be careful, when putting hay in the mound, that it's really cool and dry enough. It's not worth losing a barn to save a little feed value.

On Oct 11, 2003 our neighboring region is having a regional meeting at the Ashland County Fair. They will have several classes of Dexters showing, if you can plan to stop in. I will be there to give an update for the 2004 AGM in Meadville, Pennsylvania.

The 2003 AGM was in Stillwater, Oklahoma during a hot spell where the coolest temperature was 106°F. But the show and sale set records - top price was \$3,100 for a bull. We can easily promise that northwest Pennsylvania will not be in the high 90's, let alone the 100's, on July 16 and 17, 2004.

There was a lot of work being done behind the scenes to produce such a quality show in Oklahoma. The different committees did accomplish several things through a progressive year.

There is now a DNA test to determine if an animal is a carrier of one of the two dwarf genes responsible for producing a bulldog. Just think of the possibilities when you line up your breeding program if you no longer have to worry about a short-legged cow mating a short-legged bull. The testing is voluntary, the same as

classifying is voluntary. Currently a blood sample in a purple top tube is necessary. In the future, a hair sample will sufficient as a management tool. My herd was classified this spring; not because I am a Director or that I am on the Science Committee, but to get a true non-bias score as to what my herd is.

The classifiers only classify cattle, but not only our breed. When they schedule a state, they're doing Guernsey, Brown Swiss, and Milking Shorthorns as well as Dexters. They will start in one corner of the state and cover the entire state in a timely manner. When you submit your herd to be classified, it is important to provide an accurate number of animals to be done.

The Classifiers are available after 4 p.m. because the last thing a dairy farmer wants is to be disturbed when they're milking. Weekends are also sometimes available, and classifying animals beats watching TV in a motel. The classifiers are here to help us, but we need to help them. If for some reason you will not be available when they schedule your farm, Please contact them as soon as possible!

The ADCA website is open to all Dexter members to advertise their farm as a Dexter breeder (www.dextercattle.org). Just listing your farm name and city where you are located allows a lot of speculating dexter owners to inquire further towards becoming Dexter owners.

All that is needed to be listed is to be a current Dexter member in good standing, and forward your name and information to me at markedlyn@cs.com or Mark Muir, 10509 Rte 6, Union City, PA 16438.

fall and hope to have the support of the members in Region IV.


A big Western "Welcome" to those in New Mexico added to Region IV. I hope their addition to our region will afford them closer contact with breeders in the area.

SALES REQUIREMENTS FOR SEMEN


