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Message from the President

Chris Ricard, ADCA President

I know that a lot of members are wondering what just happened with the ADCA and I wanted to take a moment and answer some questions that have come up.

What just happened with the ADCA ???

The board of directors for the ADCA wanted to make some changes in the organization and how it does business. One item specifically, they wanted to separate the positions of Secretary, Treasurer, and Registrar

Why did the Directors want to do this ???

As the ADCA continues to grow the workload is becoming too much for one person to handle. The most important thing to accommodate the membership is the timely return of papers for the stock sold and transferred and the conducting of business in a professional manner.

What of the old saying "If it isn't Broke Don't Fix it"????

Well that is true..... Rosemary has done a wonderful job for the ADCA and its membership. At the Missouri meeting she was asked to stay on as the registrar and the vote was 14 -0 to have her stay on. We as an organization need to put processes and safeguards in place so that should anything happen to one person the business of the association can continue. For instance, did you know that up until now there was only one signature on the ADCA accounts? If anything had happened to Rosemary, the funds of the ADCA would have been frozen. This is why we needed to put some of these changes in place.

Why as a member was I not told what was going on ???

You were not told what was going on because the former president of the organization told the directors not to let you, the membership, know what was happening. The thought was that if we can keep it under wraps it would be better. This was totally and completely wrong and the directors that were working for you were hung out to dry. This will never happen again.

Was This a "Hostile Takeover" ???

This was not a takeover. This was a majority decision by the ADCA board of directors. The board of directors felt that this action was needed for the organization to grow and move forward.

I heard that the ADCA Delaware Agent resigned. Is that true. ???

Yes it is. Mr. Mark Davis did resign as the Delaware Agent for the Corporation on the night of the AGM. A new Delaware agent for the corporation has been installed in place of Mr. Davis.

Is it true that a number of Directors and officers resigned at the AGM ???

Yes it is. Five Directors did. As an interim situation, existing directors have been installed in their place until elections for new directors can be done. We have not left any region without representation.

Is it true that another Breed Organization has been formed ???

Yes it is. The resigned directors have formed a new breed organization that will be competing with the ADCA. It should also be noted that this organization was started prior to the ADCA AGM in July.

What does that mean for our cows ????

Nothing..... your cows are the same cows with their same registrations. The ADCA is not going anywhere. Should you choose to purchase a cow that was registered with the other organization, we will

honor it and register it the same as if it was from a foreign registry. A proof of registration with that organization and a (5) generation pedigree will be required.

What does that mean for the ADCA and its members ???

Nothingwe will continue to do what we do best.... Raise, Promote and Sell Dexters. The ADCA still maintains the oldest, most complete Dexter registry for the animals and we will be continuing to make improvements for the membership. One of the pieces of work will be to update and finish the On Line Pedigree System in place on the ADCA website.

How do we move forward ????

The ADCA is still the only American Dexter Cattle Association. We will continue to work both internally and through our international organizations to promote our breed. We are going to be moving forward with a number of items that are going to be important to the membership.

The first of these is the introduction of registration for Steers and Oxen. This was a request from the membership and we have responded to it. Starting immediately Steers and Oxen will be admitted into the herd book based on the rules established. Please have a look at Section 7 of the ADCA Rules and Regulations as well as the additional items for Steers and Oxen.

Another change in the ADCA will be regular quarterly conference calls for the directors and officers. The ADCA has grown too large for all the business of the association to be done in a once a year meeting. These conference calls will have a set agenda, and the minutes of these meetings will be posted in the following quarter's Bulletin. If you would like something placed on the Agenda please contact your regional director.

Moving forward, the business of the ADCA will be totally transparent and above board. This has not always been the case in the recent past, but not because of the

efforts of your directors who serve you. I would urge all of you, if you have any further questions or would like further information on what has happened, to contact your regional director or myself.

We need to get you to get involved!!! Elections in several regions will be taking place. You have a voiceuse it. In addition, we are always looking for members to serve on committees. Please give us the benefit of your knowledge. This is a member-based organization and we want to get as many members involved in the ADCA as we can. These are very exciting times in the ADCA and I am looking forward to being involved as this organization evolves and continues to grow because of your efforts. But it cannot happen without you.

Attention Oxen Owners and 4H Steer Owners



Purchasing Your First Livestock

There are many people who are acquiring Dexter cattle for the first time. Many have no farming or livestock background so they purchase the first animals which are for sale in their price range close to home. In many cases they purchase substandard animals because they do not have the knowledge necessary to make an informed decision. In some cases, they end up with animals which have major faults or problems which they do not know how to deal with, and within a few years they are no longer Dexter breeders. In some cases the animals are being sold by persons who have the lack of knowledge that the buyer has.

In this article, points will be made which the reader will find helpful in the evaluation of animals so they may purchase the best that they can afford.

First the buyer should educate themselves to the breed standard. Any animal which does not meet the standard should be rejected. Once the standard is known then, in the case of Dexters, a person has some decisions to make. Since there are many differences in the breed a person should determine if they want polled or horned, long, short or medium leg, and black, red or dun color. All are accepted in the Dexter breed and it is up to the individual as to what they want to breed.

The characteristics which should be evaluated are the same in all breeds and species of animals. First, look at the animal from a distance. Observe the overall appearance of the animal - does it appear proportional and pleasing to the eye? Is it short in overall appearance in relationship to the size of the animal? Animals which are not proportional or are too short in relationship to size should be rejected.

Cows should have a feminine head, and bulls a masculine head which blends nicely into the neck and shoulders. Avoid animals which have long narrow necks which do not blend nicely.

The back should be straight and level from the neck to the tail head. Tail head should be set at the end of the spine above the anus. In looking at the animal, it should give a square appearance.

A tail which is set too far forward or too far back will leave an unbalanced animal. The tail head too far forward will cause manure to set on the vaginal shelf, leading to vaginal infections which can cause infertility. Bulls breeding animals with this defect will carry contamination into the vagina, which can cause infection. Both incorrect tail set will cause the animal to have a sloping-off appearance rather than a nice square set. A bull with an improper tail set will likely carry this on to his offspring.

The underline should be level and straight from the brisket to the back where the scrotum or udder is located. The scrotum should be set squarely between the rear legs and should have a large circumference. Udder should have four will-placed teats located on the four corners of the udder. Teats should be of medium size and placed so that they hang straight down or at a slight outward angle. Teats which are too large, point outward, or are too high up on the udder will cause problems for the calf or farmer if the cow is to be milked. Calves will hunt for a teat up high and to the outside of the udder. If the above defects are present then the farmer will have to spend a large amount of time teaching the calf where the teat is located. Large teats will be difficult for a small-mouthed calf to get into its mouth.

The rear and front udder attachments are important, for they hold the udder in proper position. If the front attachments are too far back on the underside, or are

Purchasing Your Livestock con't weak, the udder will hang down in the front. The same is true of the rear attachments. In time this leads to an udder which will hang down close to the ground. An udder which hangs close to the ground will cause infections and mastitis.

A well-attached udder will be small to medium in size, and when the cow dries up it will not be easily seen from the side or rear. A large udder does not necessarily indicate good milking ability. An animal which has been over-fed as a calf will put fat deposits in the udder. For each cell of fat in the udder, a milk producing cell will not be formed, leading to diminished milk production as an adult.

Animals should stand squarely on their legs which should be set at the four corners of the body. The legs should have a large enough bone to be able to carry the mature weight of the animal. Back legs should have a slight bend from the hock to the hoof. Animals should be neither sickle-hocked nor post-legged. Hooves should be set at the end of the leg bone to where the animal will walk squarely on their toes. If they are walking down on their dew claw or too far up on their toes, then they should be rejected for breeding.

When observing an animal from the front or back, the legs should be straight, turning neither in nor out.

Animals should be set wide between the legs giving the chest and abdominal floor the capacity necessary for the organs and a calf. Capacity is important for many different reasons. First is so that the animal can eat enough to be able to maintain itself. When a cow has a calf growing inside, she must have enough capacity to be able to breath, eat, store food, and grow the calf.

The spring to the ribs is very important since, when the organs are pushed up against the diaphragm, there must be enough room for the lungs to work properly. The body must have enough room when the stomach is pushed up against the diaphragm that it can still fill with food. An animal with a small capacity cannot eat enough during preg-

nancy to give growth to the calf and maintain the cow.

When a person is looking at animals, they must determine which defects in an animal you are willing to live with. There are many small problems which, when bred properly, can be corrected in a generation or two, such as udder attachments, feet and leg problems, body capacity, teat placement, and muscling.

Look at the udder and testes carefully. Palpate them to make sure that there are no hard places or restrictions in the teats. In the case of the bull, make sure that the testes are not hard or have any abnormalities.

If the udder quarter is hard, the teat canals fibrous, or the testes are hard, reject the animal. If possible, have a breeding soundness exam done by a vet who will check the sperm. If a BSE cannot be done, then a written statement from the owner on the breeding ability of the bull should be obtained.

When looking for breeding stock you should, when possible, see the offspring of the animal being purchased. If the offspring exhibits undesirable traits that the parents have or do not have, then the animal should be rejected. Animals should appear to be in good health, neither too fat nor too thin, should not have any discharge from the nose, have clear eyes, and have a smooth and shiny coat. Check with the owner as to the last date of deworming and the drug used. If a vaccination program is being used, when was it done and what was used?

Even after close observation and evaluation, there are items which will not become apparent until you have had the animal for a time. These are such things as mothering ability, calving ease, temperament, and keeping ability. Keeping ability refers to how the body is maintained in relationship to the amount of feed consumed.

As an old farmer told me many years ago, breed good ones to good ones and you will have good animals. Breed bad ones to bad ones you get bad ones. If you breed good ones to bad ones it can go either way.

DNA Testing for Dexter Cattle: An Update

John Potter, ADCA Genetics Committee (updated 1/1/2004)

Two additions in 2003 to the DNA testing program for Dexter cattle provided the incentive for writing this article. This update lists the tests that are now available and gives the basic information about each of them. In an ideal world a single company would conduct all of the tests that we need. In the real world especially remembering the fact that Dexters are a minor breed - we must accept the fact that three different companies, each with its own application, conduct our four tests at this time. Applications for all of the tests are available upon request from John Potter by telephone (269-545-2455), by email (jpotter@remc11.k12.mi.us), or by USPS mail (2524 W. Elm Valley Road, Galien, MI 49113). When requesting an application, please specify whether you want it sent by email (MS Word document attachment), USPS mail, or fax, and provide the information relevant to your preference. DNA for all of these tests may be obtained from hair, semen, or blood.

All of the applications contain the instructions for using hair and semen as the source of DNA. Since using blood as the source of DNA tends to be considerably more complicated and expensive, we have not included instructions for using blood on all of the applications. If you wish to use blood, please contact me for the details. Since the testing companies' procedures for packaging, labeling, and sending samples vary, please read each application's instructions carefully. Each application contains the mailing address of the company that conducts the test. Complete applications and full payment accompanying the samples are prerequisites for all of the tests. If you have any questions about the instructions and procedures, feel free to contact me. The following chart contains the basic information about the four tests that are now available. Details about the basic information are given in footnotes below the chart.

The procedures and applications for the red factor test and for DNA genotyping remain the same as published in the 2004 Membership Directory except that the application forms will soon be available on the ADCA website at http://www.dextercattle.org. Also please check the website for developments and updates regarding the chondrodysplasia and dun tests. We hope to have new information there by mid September.

Footnotes to Table on DNA Testing

- 1. In order to register a Dexter as red, it must be tested (DNA verified) as red unless it is the offspring of a registered red sire and a registered red dam. If both parents are registered reds, then testing is not required. Please refer to the article, "Color Genetics and Registration of Dexters," that begins on page 22 of the 2003 ADCA Membership Directory. The article also appears on the ADCA website.
- 2. A breeder may wish to test a black or dun animal to determine if it carries a hidden red gene. (A black or dun animal that has a verified red parent does not need to be tested: It carries a hidden red gene.)
- 3. If the test result is needed for registration of the animal (See #1), then the breeder must sign and date the **Release to ADCA** on the application. Photocopies of reports furnished by breeders are not accepted for registration purposes.
- 4. A breeder may wish to test a black or red animal to determine if it carries a hidden dun gene. (A black Dexter may carry one hidden dun gene, and a red Dexter may carry one or two hidden dun genes.)
- 5. If the Dun test is requested from the same sample as the Chondrodysplasia test, then the cost for the Dun test is \$10/sample added to the cost of the Chondrodysplasia test. Please complete the application accordingly.
- 6. If you wish to have only the Dun test carried out, do not sign and date the **Release to ADCA** on the application. If both tests (Chondrodysplasia and Dun) are requested from the same sample (See #5), then both tests' results will be sent to the ADCA Registry Office if the breeder has signed and dated the release.
- 7. Mating a carrier bull to a carrier female has a 25% probability of producing a bulldog calf, a 50% probability of producing a carrier calf, and a 25% probability of producing

- a non-carrier calf. Mating a carrier of either sex to a non-carrier of the opposite sex has a 50% probability of producing either a carrier calf or a non-carrier calf but no chance of producing a bulldog calf. Mating two non-carriers produces only non-carrier calves: no carrier or bulldog calves. Please refer to the article about chondrodysplasia that begins on page 25 of the 2003 ADCA Membership Directory.
- 8. If eleven (11) or more samples are submitted at the same time, the cost per test is \$28.
- 9. As of January 1, 2004, no requirement exists for the notification of the ADCA Registry Office regarding the chondrodysplasia carrier or non-carrier status of any Dexter. However, breeders may request that Agrigenomics send their results to the ADCA for the record by signing the **Release to ADCA** on the application.
- 10. Beginning January 1, 2003, the ADCA required that the DNA Genotype of all bulls used for out-of-herd AI be on file in its Registry Office before calves sired by those bulls can be registered. While any AI bull whose blood type was on file in the Registry Office prior to January 1, 2003, is exempt from the DNA Genotyping requirement, the person who sells semen from that bull is encouraged to request DNA Genotyping for the sake of future reference or parentage questions.
- 11. DNA Genotyping can be used to verify the parentage of an animal provided all appropriate DNA is submitted for analysis. Contact John Potter if you have questions about this option.
- 12. The service agreement between ImmGen, Inc. and the ADCA for DNA Genotyping stipulates that ImmGen will report the results of their services to the ADCA only. If you wish to have a copy of the report, please request it from the Registrar or from John Potter.





Region 8 Tough Month





We are all disheartened by that let it suffice to say that as a newly-elected Director I observed rigid, obsessive control by ADCA Officers regarding ADCA policy decisions, committee results, and financial records availability. ADCA by-laws state that the Board of Directors manage the affairs of the Corporation and be empowered to act for the Corporation. When the majority of the Board stood firm enforcing ADCA Rules and Regulations, a campaign of propaganda was instigated to demoralize and divide both membership

The number of bulls to be tested must be specified in the request.

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
