REGION 2

As with most of the United States, we have been hit with some unusual weather. During Thanksgiving we had freezing temps and snow, then the week of Christmas another week with nights dipping down into the teens.

The weather forecast is calling for another round of freezing temps. I know several of you may laugh at that because you deal with freezing temps all the time, but we are used to rain and lots of mud. Most of us do not have water systems that are set up for hard freezing, so we bucket warm water to our cattle or break ice when needed.

It was suggested by my vet during the first round of freezing temps that I invest in some stock tank heaters. I took his suggestion and purchased one to try. WOW! The cows seem to drink more water and look warmer. It even helped keep the milk production on the cow that I was milking up.

I now own three tank heaters and changed some fencing around so that one water trough is shared by two pastures. I am looking for suggestions on a tank heating system where no power is available.

Now on to upcoming news. The Puyallup Spring Fair is right around the corner, and the Dexter cattle will be there April 14-17. There will be a show for Dexters, too. For entries or show info, contact Stefani Millman at hardfact@aol.com. This fair hosts the all-breed classic sale that brings in prospective cattle buyers, making this a great fair to market Dexter cattle.

Calving season is just around the corner, so make sure your cattle have access to plenty of minerals. Studies show that cattle that are not deficient in minerals will have a easier time at

calving and a healthier calf and breed back quicker. I like to offer my cattle free choice of loose minerals instead pressed blocks, because it is easier for them to consume the amount there bodies need. It is best to use a mineral supplement that has been made for your area. You can contact the agricultural extension office in your area to determine what your area may be deficient in.

REGION 4

As breeders of a rather large herd of Dexter cattle, we have a tendency to experience many things those with smaller herds may never encounter. As these things happen to us, we like to share them with everyone in hopes that these experiences can be helpful to others.

Lumpy jaw in cattle. Lumpy jaw, or actinomycosis, produces immovable, hard swellings on the upper and lower jawbones of cattle, commonly at the central molar level. It is caused by an anaerobic micro-organism, Actinomyces bovis.

The bacterium invades tissue through breaks in the lining of the mouth caused by eating rough forage. The tumor-like swellings develop slowly and may take several months to reach a noticeable size. Lumpy jaw may be well-advanced before external signs are visible.

We experience many things those with smaller herds may never encounter.

In advanced cases, openings develop and discharge small amounts of of sticky puss. the disease progresses, chewing becomes more difficult and painful. The most common treatments are iodine therapy or tetracyclines. Treatment is often ineffective.

We've had two cases of lumpy jaw in our herd. The first case was too far advanced before it was detected. The cow involved, a 5-year-old, appeared to have no problems eating or tending to her calf. However, by the time the disease "showed" itself, it was too late

(Continued from p. 5) for the cow. We were able to butcher her and save the meat.

The second cow is a 3-year-old. When we noticed the lump on her jaw, we immediately brought her in for treatment. The vet removed some of the infected tissue and treated her with iodine therapy daily for a week.

She appeared to improve. This happened about six months ago, and she is again showing the signs of lumpy jaw. She has now been brought into the corral for analysis by the vet.

As she is quite pregnant, treatment may have to be postponed until after the birth and weaning of the calf. We will wait for the examination by the vet and pass on the outcome to

Hydroallantois (Hydrops) This illness is associated with pregnancy and is usually seen in the last trimester. Excess fluid is produced in the outer water sac. The fetus is often guite small for its stage of gestation, and there is a sudden increase of fluid, which becomes noticeable by about six to seven months when the cow develops a huge belly.

The large volume of fluid puts pressure on her lungs and gut; she doesn't have room to breathe and can't eat very much. She may become so weak and/or impaired by her large belly that she has trouble getting up and down. Survival is possible, but not very likely. Veterinary advice is necessary.

As all of our cows are starting showing signs of their pregnancy, we noticed one cow in particular that seemed to be exceptional large for the stage of pregnancy she was in. We watched her very closely, and within days she had become huge.

After consultation with our veterinarian, it was decided that the best course of action was to put her down. We were able to butcher her and save the meat. The fetus was about the size of a small pig, but it was already dead.

Vet's Corner

Options for pregnancy-testing your cows

If you usually have your cows pregnancy-checked, you probably have done it already. If you haven't or plan to do it, there are basically four different options. All four have differing price tags, depending on who does it.

The first and most traditional option is rectal palpation of the uterus to feel for the fetus and related signs of pregnancy (placenta, uterine fluid, uterine artery diameter). The palpater is not only able to estimate gestation length at the time of palpation, but also to detect any abnormal findings (uterine infection, scarring, mummified fetus, cystic ovaries, etc.).

Most palpaters are the most accurate within the first four months of pregnancy, and most can detect pregnancy at 35 days. By five months, the uterus has fallen so far over the brim of the pelvis that it becomes more difficult to reach the fetus, but estimations can still be made based on placental attachments (cotyledons) and uterine artery diameter.

The second option is ultrasound and has been around for years. It has become more popular in the last 10 years, especially for those that artificially inseminate.

It has all the capabilities of rectal palpation plus more and with better accuracy. It enables the veterinarian to see the fetus on a monitor or head set, making it easier to judge the viability of the fetus (heartbeat) and detect twins or sex the fetus. The

technology also allows you to freeze the image on the screen, giving you the opportunity to measure the fetus and predict a more accurate calving date vs rectal palpation. Abnormalities or infection are also easier to detect, as the scan can pick up great detail (millimeters) of the reproductive tract.

If you are a registered breeder who utilizes artificial insemination (AI) prior to bull turn-out, this option may be the most ideal, as it would allow you to determine between AI versus bull-bred more confidently. In order to do that, you must wait at least 14 days between AI and bull turn-out to differentiate between the two.

Pregnancy detection also tells you a lot about the fertility of your bull.

Most scanners are able to detect a viable fetus as early as 26 days after conception. The biggest limitation with ultrasound is that it becomes virtually impossible to do after 90 days of gestation. This is mainly due to the location of the uterus and the size of the fetus. Some heifers can be done as late as 100 days, but it will take more time. If you are interested in finding out the sex of the calf, the ideal range is 70-80 days.

Usually ultrasound costs an extra \$20-30 an hour, but some may charge by the head for smaller numbers.

The third option is more recent and involves taking blood samples that can be sent in to determine pregnancy. It is called BioPRYN, which is

a partial acronym for "Pregnant Ruminant Yes or No." That is basically all it tells you: "Is she pregnant? Y or N." It tests for a Pregnancy Specific Protein B (PSPB) produced by the placenta and present in the serum of pregnant cows.

Samples can be taken as early as 30 days after breeding. The cow must be at least 90 days past her previous calving, as some residual PSPB from the last calf may be present in the blood if bred back too soon.

Most labs are able to get results by the next day once they are received, with an overall accuracy of 97 percent. The cost is usually pretty comparable to rectal palpation and cheaper

than ultrasound.

It may be convenient for those who are able to draw their own blood, but it also has its own limitions. The cow still most go through

tations. The cow still most go through a head-gate or chute in order to get a blood sample, and it does not tell you anything about the viability of the fetus at that time. It also does not tell you an estimated calving date, but it would be useful if your herd was monitored close enough to record the breeding dates. For those who do not have a veterinarian close by, this would be an option.

The forth option is to do nothing, but it still involves some cost. The cost depends on how many cows are open and when you realize that they are open. The cost of feeding an open cow adds up over the winter, as does the potential genetic loss of not finding

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the problem soon enough and ending up with a "non-breeder."

Non-breeders usually result from damage to the uterus, either from a difficult calving, an abortion that mummifies, or from a cow that gets over-conditioned and deposits too much fat in the pelvis.

Pregnancy detection also tells you a lot about the fertility of your bull. If a majority of your cows cycle two to three times before settling, there may be an issue with your bull's fertility, and a breeding soundness exam should be done. In addition, open cows may be an indication of other issues: nutrition, presence of molds, infectious disease, etc.

I am sure you are all looking forward to this year's calf crop — I know I am! Hope your calving season goes well and that all your cows are with calf. Happy 2011!

Happy 100th birthday, Evelyn Anderson!

Okay, streamers up, banner, balloons. Everyone's got their party hats on? Confetti? Noise makers? Alright everyone, lights out, shhh. . . .

Wait a minute. Maybe this isn't such a good idea. She is turning 100 years old, after all. We don't want to make her jump too high. On second thought, no, don't light those candles!

You may not know Evelyn Anderson by name, but it's a good chance her breeding can be found in your herd. Evelyn started breeding Dexter cattle in the early 1990s. She bred Dexters for over 20 years and created the known A.I. bulls *Hillview Red Wing*, *Hillview Morris 02* and *Hillview Ramble Ruler*.

Evelyn was one of the first Dexter breeders who bred by means of artificial insemination and used such bulls as Thomas' Superstition, Lucifer of Knotting, Bedford Romarc Rambler, Saltaire Platinum and Riverhill Saturn's Galaxy. This was the same way she bred her Aberdeen Angus in the 1970s.

Artificial insemination to Evelyn was "the poor man's opportunity to have exceptional cattle." She raised quality Angus, not just something with "four legs and a tail," as she used to say.

Born in Osawatomie, Kan., Feb. 8, 1911, Evelyn Cornelius was the second-oldest of four girls. Her parents owned a farm and raised cattle, and she always loved cows, even as a child. Evelyn married in 1931; she and Lute had two daughters, Joan and Lois. In 1952 when the girls were grown and she and Lute divorced, Evelyn worked as a salesperson for Midwest Electric. Here she sold major appliances, which she took great pride in, as the other ladies were only allowed to sell small appliances and toasters. In fact, she even had her own business cards and modeled for an ad in the Topeka newspaper next to the "The Beautiful New 1953 General Electric Refrigerator."

In 1958 Evelyn and her daughter Lois packed up and followed Joan and her family to Anaheim, Calif., and from 1959 to 1971 she worked at the happiest place on earth, Disneyland. Here she tended the Timex Shop and Tobacco Shop on Main Street and later the Gourmet Shop that sold fabulous gourmet kitchenware from Europe. It was here she was inspired to go way beyond the simple farm food she grew up on and became a gourmet cook.

Take a look at your Dexter bloodlines. You may just find they've been touched by this accomplished cattlewoman.

> Upon her retirement in 1971, Evelyn and her 10-year husband "Andy" Anderson moved back to Kansas, where they leased a farm from her cousin. This is when she started raising show-winning Aberdeen Angus and attended the Graham School for Cattlemen.

Her daughter Joan bought a ranch and decided to move to New Plymouth, Idaho, in 1988. Now with both Joan and Evelyn widowed, they thought it would be a good idea to live together, and Evelyn packed up not only herself, but her herd of Angus and made the move to New Plymouth. It was here Joan lost her battle to cancer in 1992, and the ranch was sold.

Time for Evelyn to move on, she



persuaded top Angus breeders to buy her stock. These "old boys" were amazed at the caliber of cows she had in her pasture. One breeder commented, "What business does a little lady like you have with cows like that?" Evelyn replied, "Doesn't cost any more to feed a good one than a bad one."

Evelyn moved once again to
California to her daughter Lois',
where she lived in a lovely guest
cottage in the small mountain
community of Idyllwild. Although it was nice there was something missing ...cows!

Within a few years Evelyn found and leased a large ranch about an hour's drive from her cottage home. Here is where she built up her new herd, but it wasn't Angus, it was Dexter cattle.

Her first Dexter cow was purchased from Jack Goodman of Ida-J-Mar farms. *Ida-J-Mar Leta* was to be her milk cow, and between 1994 and 2005 she built up quite a herd of Dexters on that leased property. Dexters that are influential to us today. Dexters that are far more than "four legs and a tail."

Beyond Dexter cattle, Evelyn "Gammie" Anderson has seven grandchildren, 13 great grandchildren and three great-great grandchildren, none of which share her passion for cattle. She was a "city girl" for many years, although you won't hear that from her. She dressed beautifully in clothes she had sewn or knitted herself. She was a fabulous seamstress, accomplished needlewoman, a gourmet cook and loved to host dinner parties and entertain with her husband Andy. She currently resides at the Villa de Anza Retirement Home in Riverside, Calif.

Evelyn is in excellent health and is expected to make it well beyond 100. She remembers her cattle and enjoys receiving photos and notes "from them." Take a look at your Dexter bloodlines. You may just find they've been touched by this accomplished cattlewoman.



October-December 2010 Standard operating procedures (SOP) for registration membership status

Work continued on clarification of wording for the SOPs regarding those individuals qualifying for Registration Membership status as well as the procedure to refer issues/complaints through a regional director or officer to the Code of Conduct and Ethics Committee.

Motion for changes to be made to SOP regarding registration or transfer of animals

Clay Adams moved that the following changes be made to the SOP of the American Dexter Cattle Association:

- ► Change the heading from "Registration of Animals" to "Registration and Transfer of Animals."
- ► Under "Purpose" add the words "and transferring" before the word "their."
- ► Change the heading from "General Information for Registration" to "General Information for Registration

and Transfer."

► Under the section titled "Registration Procedure":

Paragraph 1: Delete the words "or transfer" from the first sentence.

Paragraph 7: Delete and substitute the following:

7. Application for registration of an animal without both sire and dam previously registered in the ADCA registry shall be submitted with a copy the registration certificates of the sire and the dam showing ownership and a five-generation (62-ancestor) registered purebred pedigree from the registry of origin. This information is in addition to the information required for all registrations. These applications shall be reviewed by the registrar and may also be reviewed by the Pedigree/Genetics Committee.

Paragraph 10: Add the word "ADCA" before "registration...." in the last sentence. At the end of paragraph 10, add the following sentence: "If the sire and dam do not have

ADCA registration numbers, the application for registration shall be submitted with the information as required for registration where the sire and dam are not previously registered in the ADCA registry."

Paragraph 12: Delete the first two sentences. Add a section titled "Transfer Procedure:"

- 1. Transfers shall apply to change in ownership of an animal previously registered with the ADCA.
- A transfer application is provided on the backside of each ADCA registration certificate.

Change the heading of the section on foreign animals to "Registration of Foreign Animals and Animals Registered in Another Dexter Registry."

Paragraph 1: Delete the words "an Association with."

Paragraph 2: Delete the word "Association" and insert "Registry."

Registration of Foreign Animals and Animals Registered in Another Dexter Registry.

Certificate of incorporation and bylaws discussion

A new copy of the certificate of incorporation and new draft of the bylaws were distributed Oct. 18 to all regional directors and officers.

Backup for the registrar

Registrar Chuck Daggett felt it would be a good idea to have an individual who is acquainted with the registry, online pedigree and web software available to step in to do the work in case of an emergency. Though his health is good and he still enjoys doing it, it is his feeling that we would be poor managers if we did not have a backup plan. The programmer with centric software would help the new person get acquainted with the registry. But currently, no one knows how the online information is put into the registry and how the reports are run. The Board of Directors (BOD) is pursuing the location of a qualified individual to become Chuck's backup.

Herd Book

There was discussion about the decision to no longer print hard copies of the Herd Book but to have it available as a PDF file on the web site.

For those members wanting a hard copy, it was suggested that a note be put next to the download link on the web site that the *Herd Book* can be downloaded and printed (at Copy Max, Staples, etc.) for less cost to the member than it would be to have the ADCA print and mail a copy.

Resolution to approve bylaws changes

A vote to approve the resolution for the current bylaws changes to be filed was unanimously approved by all regional directors and the immediate past president.

Resolution to approve certificate of incorporation

A vote to approve the certificate of incorporation was unanimously approved by all regional directors and the immediate past president.

Reporting A2 testing results

The BOD is exploring a way to make all of the existing or imminent DNA reports available. Rewriting the registry and the online pedigree programs every time a new one pops up is not a wise use of resources.

Motion to clarify and/or change the age limits set forth in ADCArun shows

It was felt that the classes and ages are set for the 2011 AGM. If changes are wanted, let the Show & Sale Committee present it to the board at our meetings.

The following motion was made by Warren Coad to clarify and/or change the age limits set forth in ADCA-run shows: Juniors competing in junior/youth shows must be 7-18 years old as of Jan. 1 of the year the show is held. Juniors under the age of 7 or those with special needs may show with adult assistance in noncompetitive classes.

The open show is open to all exhibitors 7 and over. Exhibitors must be able to control their animal in the ring without assistance and without hindering others' performances or will be ejected from the ring at the judge's discretion.

A straw poll was taken and didn't have enough support to pass. President Roberta Wieringa tabled this motion to be considered at the 2011 Annual General Meeting (AGM) for an official vote.

U C Davis

Warren Coad suggested that the Pedigree & Genetics Committee sign a contract with U C Davis for testing in order to prevent members from having to join another registry to save money for testing.

Idaho member request

A member in Idaho requested the ADCA consider instituting a discount rate for the transfer of large numbers of animals into the registry.

Discussion:

- ► Chuck Daggett responded that it takes more than twice the time to register animals with registrations outside the ADCA, as their registration requires investigation of up to four generations to verify pedigree.
- ▶It was suggested that Chuck change the wording on the online transfer page immediately, as it states that if you are transferring from another registry you just have to mail the certificate.
- ►It was suggested that a discount would be on transfer/registration only and that genotyping still be required as outlined in our rules.
- ▶It was noted that other registries have reduced price on quantity registrations and suggested that a whole herd price (charging \$15 above a specified number) be considered to encourage breeders to join the ADCA and would this be for only PDCA registrations.
- ▶It was also expressed that all our fees should be the same across the membership: loyal ADCA folks, newcomers and/or hopefuls.

It was noted that it is good to let them know that we have considered their dilemma, but still feel that it is in the best interests of our ADCA organization to charge the full rate for new registrations into our registry. They can enter a few at a time or all at once, depending upon their needs and ability.

A straw vote was taken, and it was apparent the majority is not in favor of any fee discounts for registrations. President Roberta Wieringa added that it could also create problems from an administrative view – meaning who, why, how much, etc., and who would keep track of it.

Member question

Chuck had a phone call from a mem-

ber dealing with an individual advising a member not to buy a polled animal because polled animals (including those registered and genotyped with the ADCA) have questionable animals in their pedigrees. This goes beyond a personal bias when an individual advises members not to buy animal from our registry. Although this is third-person information, it is an honest report from a member.

Documentation needs to be made regarding the individual in question, including her negative chat room comments, before referring the issue to the Code of Conduct and Ethics Committee.

Houston 2012

The Houston show is in mid March, and show entries for 2011 are due now.

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The rules, premiums and classes for Houston 2012 are due by June 2011.

I do want to let you know there has been a change in hotels, so if you have already made your reservations, I apologize. The original hotel is under new management and going through some renovations, and I was just too afraid of it not being ready by the time the AGM got here to stay with it. Again, sorry for any inconvenience.

Thank you to all who have already signed up to help and sponsor classes. It is greatly appreciated!

Please note the show requirement for bulls over the age of 2 saying they must have sired a calf has been removed by the Show Committee.

Keep watching the web site for updates on show info, and don't forget to send your photos in for the contest, nomination forms, applications, registrations, ads and so forth.

Also, bulls coming to the AGM for show only DO NOT need a trichomoniasis test. ONLY bulls for over 12 months of age entering Oklahoma from any state for sale must be tested negative for trich within 30 days of entry and be identified with an official identification device. Acceptable IDs are a silver metal USDA tag. 840 RFID tag, registration tattoo or brand if accompanied by a copy of the registration papers.

Exceptions are bulls less than 24 months of age that can be certified as virgin bulls, bulls consigned directly to slaughter and rodeo or bucking bulls that travel to an event and then leave the state.

Three negative culture tests done at weekly intervals or one negative PCR test meets the Oklahoma testing requirements.

For ALL bulls entering Oklahoma, applicable tuberculosis and/or brucellosis entry requirements must be met, and the shipment must have a

valid certificate of veterinary inspection. For additional information regarding Oklahoma entry requirements, call the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, Forestry (ODAFF) permit line at (405) 522-6141, or check the ODAFF web page, www.oda.state.ok.us.

2011 Annual General Meeting Show and Sale Guidelines

The following rules and regulations will apply to the 2011 National Dexter Cattle Show and Sale being held in Stillwater, Okla. Please read through the entire guidelines.

General Guidelines

- Exhibitors must be current members of the American Dexter Cattle Association.
- All animals must be properly identified using ear tags, neck chains, brands, etc., and must be legibly tattooed with the exact alpha-numeric identification that appears on the registration papers or have a permanent metal ear tag (calf hood vaccination for females); this number MUST appear on all health papers. Failure to have a legible and accurate tattoo will be grounds for dismissal from the event.
- All animals shown at the 2011 ADCA National Show & Sale must be halter-broke to lead and tie. There are NO pen classes at the 2011 National Show and Sale in Stillwater, Okla. Animals MUST be tied. Any animal deemed unmanageable by the Show and Sale Committee before or during the show will be required to leave the show arena. Cattle dismissed in this fashion are not eligible for sale or show placing, and all entry fees will be forfeited. Any animal deemed unmanageable will have to be confined to a livestock trailer. There are no holding pens available.
- The Show and Sale are two separate events.
 - Animals may be entered in the show ring for \$30.
 - Animals may be entered in the sale ring for \$30.
 - Animals may be entered in both the show and sale at a special rate of \$40.
 - All cattle must be registered with the American Dexter Cattle Association prior to entry, including steers. A copy of the registration papers, in the sole name of the exhibitor or the partnership, must be furnished with the entry form for the show or sale. In the case of junior exhibitors, they do not have to be the owner to exhibit. If a person is physically unable, animals may be shown by any non-professional person. If owners have two or more animals they want to show in the same class, THEY MUST SHOW ONE, and the additional animal(s) may be shown by any other individual in attendance.
- All entry forms and fees must be received by the deadline designated on the form. Late entries will be accepted for the sale event up to the day before the sale; however, entry forms for animals received after the deadline will not be in the sale catalog and an additional \$20 late fee will be charged. Entry fees for animals not brought to the show or sale will not be refunded.
- Health certificates will be required for all entries and will be checked and approved by the designated show veterinarian prior to the show and sale events. These

- certificates will be surrendered at unloading to the individuals supervising the checking-in of animals. For animals to be sold, the original registration and transfer papers will also be given to the individual supervising the checking-in of animals at the time of unloading. Animals from quarantined areas are not permitted to enter the show or sale event. Out-of-state entries must comply with the regulations of the state in which the show and/or sale event is taking place. See "Health Regulations" for further explanation.
- The 2011 event has a designated Show and Sale Committee. This committee will have final authority to uphold established rules and regulations. The chairman of the committee will decide questions and/or disputes.
- Females advertised as "safe in calf" must have a veterinarian's pregnancy check certificate. Bulls over 18 months of age must have a veterinarian's breeding soundness evaluation and report.
- All bulls 12 months and older must have an affixed nose ring or nose clamp.
- All cattle must be double-tied (neck rope plus halter). All cattle and staff areas must be kept clean and presentable for the duration of the show and/or sale.
- No drugs are to be administered except under the guidance of the event veterinarian.
- Every precaution will be taken to protect participants and their animals. However, neither the ADCA, the Show and Sale Committee, the location of the event nor the supervisors or their assistants will be responsible for accidents or loss associated with the participants and their animals.
- The American Dexter Cattle Association and the auctioneer(s) act only to bring the buyers and sellers together. Any warranties or claims pertaining to any animal are strictly between seller and buyer. Buyers should satisfy themselves regarding the soundness and condition of the animal before bidding on that animal.
- Bedding (shavings) will be supplied
 - Exhibitors may bring their own shavings.
 - Replacement bedding may be purchased on site.
 - Hay and feed may also be available for purchase on site or from a feed store nearby.
- Electrical outlets will be available for fans and other needs.
- Two indoor wash racks are available.
- Exhibitors may bring their own grooming chutes.

Show Guidelines

- To pay more than first-place premiums, there must be more than one exhibitor in a class. If only one animal is in a class, only the first-place premium is paid.
 - Premiums per class
 - First \$75
 - Second \$50
 - Third \$35

- Grand Champion & Reserve Grand Champion –
 Female and Bull Open and Youth
 - Grand Champion \$250 + Award Buckle
 - Reserve Grand Champion \$125 + Award Buckle
- Grand Champion & Reserve Grand Champion –
 Steer Open and Youth
 - Grand Champion \$150 + Award Buckle
 - Reserve Grand Champion \$75 + Award Buckle
- First and second places per class will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
- A class must be sponsored to receive a full premium.
- Classes with less than three participants may be combined, in which case the sponsored premium will be used to pay for show expenses.
- Calves from Cow/Calf Pairs must be registered. This includes Open Show and Photo Show.
- All steers entered in Open Show, Youth Show or Photo Show must be registered with the ADCA. Show the pride in your breeding. Keep in mind if you place in the class, that is the best form of advertising. How better to represent your breeding by the steer being registered.
- Youth ages 7-18 are eligible to show in youth classes. No one under 13 years old may show in the Open Show.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to present their cattle in a professional manner that will show the pride the owners have in their animals and in the breed. All animals **must**, at a minimum, be washed and brushed.
- Grooming is left up to the discretion of the owners as long as they abide by the items that are prohibited.

Prohibited Grooming Items

- Painting or polishing of horns or hooves with colored polish
- Artificial coat coloring
- Growth implants
- Drugs to alter the disposition of the animal
- Total body fitting, which includes sculpting of the hair when clipping and using adhesives, wax or mousse to shape the coat to hide animal flaws.
- Showmanship attire will be required and enforced in the show ring for anyone presenting cattle.
 - Collared/buttoned shirts with sleeves (length of the sleeves is determined by the season/weather)
 - Long pants (jeans or slacks) that are dark and don't have tears or holes.
 - Boots or fully enclosed heavy footwear must be worn for safety reasons.
 - Long hair must be tucked in a hat or tied back, also for safety reasons.
 - Optional belt, western hats, gloves or the use of show sticks and combs.

Prohibited items

- Baseball caps
- T-shirts or crop top shirts that leave the midriff skin showing
- Sandals or canvas shoes (for safety reasons)
- Overalls

- Baggy, low-riding pants that drag on the ground (again for safety reasons)
- The Show and Sale Committee will advise the judge regarding grooming requirements and expectations prior to the show. This will encourage the judge to look at the animal closely, not at the grooming capability of the exhibitor.
- All show animals must be broke to show (lead) at halter.
 There are NO PENS. If an unruly animal is attending, it will have to be confined to a livestock trailer. Remember, one of the selling points of this breed is its temperament and ease of handling.

- For each show, a Grand and Reserve Champion Female Dexter will be chosen as well as a Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Bull. There will also be a Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Steer.
- Championship buckles will be awarded for all Grand and Reserve Grand Champion winners and for Junior, Youth and Adult Showmanship classes. All entries in Pee-Wee Showmanship will receive a ribbon.

Sale Guidelines

- The sale ratio of male to female animals shall be 1:3.
 This applies to entries from one seller or sellers may combine entries to maintain the ratio. This is only for the FOR SALE portion of the event. Entries with the number of males exceeding this ratio may not be accepted.
- Each sale entry must include a copy of the original ADCA registration certificate. A short description may also be submitted for inclusion in the sale catalog. If the description is lengthy, then at the Show and Sale Committee's discretion the description may be edited and shortened. At unloading the seller must surrender the signed original ADCA registration as well as the signed transfer papers as appropriate for proper transfer to the new owner.
- Sale animals will be identified via neck tags that correspond to the catalog numbers; these tags will be furnished by the Show and Sale Committee for the particular event. The Show and Sale Committee will establish sale order by random draw. The sale order and other pertinent information regarding the sale will be communicated prior to the sale.
- Sellers will have the opportunity to establish a minimum sale requirement upon entry. Sellers will have the option, after all bidding is completed, to accept or decline the sale price if it is lower than the established minimum price. This option will be announced at the time of the sale.
- Changes to established minimum pricing will not be made without written consent of the seller.
- All buyers' numbers will be issued upon proper verification or identification. Photo identification is desired.
 Anyone issued a buyer number is considered liable for all accepted bids and purchases made under that number.
- The Show and Sale Committee has decided to accept cash or check. Credit cards are not accepted.
- The Show and Sale Committee will settle all disputes.
- No animal may leave the barn or be removed from the grounds without a LOAD-OUT ORDER, which will be issued by the cashier at the time of payment.
- Owners of animals that do not meet the minimum bid price and are not sold will pay 5% of the last bid or \$25, whichever is less.
- Sellers are responsible for animals until the sale is completed. (When the animal leaves the sale ring, then the buyer is responsible.)
- ADCA transfer fee wil be waived for animals sold in the sale ring! (This will offset the commission paid by the seller.)
- No private treaty sales will be allowed during the sale event. All animals offered for sale must go through the auction ring. If the animal fails to bring the established minimum during the auction and does not sell, the owner may opt to sell the animal at private treaty after the sale at a price agreed upon by both buyer and seller, off the grounds of the event or sell the animal on the grounds and pay the commission.

 Seller's settlement date will be approximately two weeks after sale and verification of buyer's check clearing the bank.

Animal Health Regulations for Participants (Health Certificates)

- The term "health certificate" or "certificate of veterinary inspection" means a legible record made on an official form of the state of origin, issued by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animal(s) listed meets the testing, vaccination, treatment and requirements of the state of destination. Unless otherwise stated in the following rules, a health certificate or certificates of veterinary inspection must accompany all animals to be exhibited or sold and be surrendered at time of unloading. Brucellosis: All breeding animals must meet the requirements for the state in which the event occurs, except animals from a certified brucellosis-free herd. The certified herd number and date of the last test must be shown on the health certificate. Bovine Trichomoniasis: Venereal disease of cattle. Because of the seriousness of the disease, ODAFF will begin enforcing regulations that require the testing of bulls entering the state or changing ownership within the state on or after Jan. 1, 2011. This does not apply to bulls that are showing only. All bulls for sale over 24 months old and 12- to 24-month-old bull that don't qualify for a virgin bull exemption must be tested. It takes about a month to get the test results back, so plan ahead if you are bringing bulls to the AGM. A virgin bull form is available at http://www.ok.gov/~okag/ais/trichregulations.pdf.
- Each animal must have a separate health paper attached to the original registration paper at the time of check-in and unloading. These papers (registration and health) must be given to the staff checking-in the animals. Photocopies of the original form if multiple animals are listed on the form will be fine as long as you have the original with you.
- Owners should keep photocopies of ALL documents.
- Animals with active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair or warts easily visible without close examination will not be permitted to sell or show and shall be subject to isolation or expulsion, depending upon the nature of the disease.
- The event will have accredited veterinarians or other state regulatory personnel for processing animals and health certificates for change of ownership as well as health papers for transporting across state lines. Fee for health papers issued by the AGM vet is covered by the fee paid to the vet.
- The minimum health and testing requirements may not qualify livestock that are to be sold or moved to a new owner or destination. The Show and Sale Committee will investigate and comply with any added requirements for livestock that are to be sold in a sale or their particular location. The Show and Sale Committee will print the hosting state's specific health requirements on the entry form that is to be signed and returned.


