As a member of the American Dexter Cattle Association, I agree that I will:

- Not knowingly make any untruthful statement in submitting applications for registry and not register animals of questionable parentage.
- Not neglect or mistreat my animal (s), but, on the contrary, at all times safeguard and further its/their well-being.
- Not transfer any animal to a party who I feel will not conscientiously look after its health, safety and well-being or may exploit or degrade or otherwise act to the detriment of the breed of animal.
- Only breed animals that I know to be in good condition and health.
- Represent my animals honestly to prospective buyers and give such advice or assistance to the buy-er as may be reasonably requested.
- Keep on the alert for and work diligently to control potentially adverse effects of known genetically inherited conditions by educating prospective buyers regarding the implications associated with the presence of these conditions in a breeding program.
- So act in my breeding practice and in dealings with others as to protect and improve the good standing and reputation of the breed and of the association.



THE 2017 60TH ANNIVERSARY AGM...IN A WORD - HOT!

As you all know, this year's AGM was again held in Salina, Kansas on Father's Day weekend. This was the second year that the AGM, Show and Sale was held at the Saline County Expo Center. Located in the middle of the town of Salina. This AGM was destined to be a special event, since it commemorated the 60th Anniversary of the ADCA. The goals for this year were to have the largest attendance ever, the greatest number of quality Dexters in the show ring, and 60 animals for sale at the live auction to commemorate the anniversary. We accomplished two out of three, falling a bit short of the 60 sale animals.

It appears that one of two things happens in June in Salina when the ADCA comes to town - either it's hot, or it's really hot and also stormy. This year we experienced the latter - really HOT and stormy weather as well. When we arrived in Salina on Wednesday evening (after leaving Michigan 13 ½ hours earlier that day) it was 103 degrees. This was at 5:30 in the evening! On Thursday, the temperature was a sweltering 102, and the threat of severe storms forced the majority of people at the Expo Center to bring their cars and trucks into the show arena to avoid the hail that was predicted. Fortunately for all of us the main part of the storm passed to the north, and all we got was a good rain. Didn't do much to cool things off however. Show day on Friday was the coolest, at 101, but Saturday was back up to 103. Obviously, the cattle and their caretakers didn't really enjoy the heat!

The AGM weekend is always filled with good — good cattle, good friends, good food and good shows. We experienced all

of these. The number of quality Dexters of all types was outstanding - over 145 entries in the various classes. We saw all colors, and also polled, dehorned and some really nice horned cattle. There was a variety of heights and body types, so a person new to the world of Dexters had an opportunity to view everything the breed has to offer. Show goers got to experience the docility of the breed in action, when Ted Anderson's bull slipped out of his show halter and decided to take a stroll around the show ring. The ring men quickly got the bull off to one end, and Ted was able to put the halter back on and lead him back to his place in the class. I'm not sure that could be as easily done with other breeds.

The show produced some outstanding winning animals, with Macheal and Rick Seydel's cow Timberview DS Angel taking Grand Champion female, Ted and Vicki Anderson's bull ESF Powerball taking Grand Champion Bull, and also Best of show.

This year's banquet and awards celebration was well attended, and awards were given to some wonderful breeders and youth who have done a lot to promote and improve the Dexter breed. The Chris Odom Youth Awards were presented by our new Youth Director, Elissa Emmons. Henry Louderback received the Junior award, and Britni Stewart received the Senior award. Additional awards were presented to David Jones — Daggett Award, and Deb Hawkins — Talisman Award.

The largest honor of the event went to Carole Ann Traynor, who has decided to retire as ADCA Secretary after serving for the last 10 years. CAT received a standing

ovation from the dinner attendees, as well as parting gifts from the Association, recognizing her years of service as Secretary. Her contributions will be sorely missed.

If there was one thing that was a bit negative for this year's AGM, it was the inability to end the weekend with a resounding sale of Quality Dexters. Less than 50% of the animals consigned to the sale were sold in the ring at auction. There are a number of possible reasons that this occurred – the travel distance to the sale for potential buyers; the early timing for the start of the auction; lack of transport to get animals back home (yes, I decided not to bring the trailer.....otherwise I'm sure that Shamrock Acres in Michigan would have had some new additions!) and generally just not enough buyer interest. A lot of thought will go into this portion of the AGM for next year.

Overall, the 60th Anniversary AGM was a resounding success. As a Dexter breeder for 30 years, we continue to look forward to these annual events — to meet up with old friends, make new friends, see quality Dexter Cattle, and to just "talk cows" with the people who come to see what this breed is all about. As we all know, the Dexter breed provides us with a lot of options — Horned, polled, black, red, dun, carrier or non-carrier. There's something for every pasture.

We look forward to seeing all of you at Salina again in 2018, on the same weekend in June. Enjoy Dexters.....not only are they nice cattle to have on the farm and to work with, but they are great on the plate as well. What more could we ask for?

Share-Milking Your Dexter Cow

I often get asked about milking Dexters, and some people are shocked to learn that you can milk & NOT be tied down to milking twice a day, every day. That is the beauty of share-milking, or calf-sharing. I've been at this share-milking thing for a good while now, and through trial & error over the years and talking with others who share-milk, I've found a routine that I & my cows are quite happy with.

If you're not already familiar with the terms, "share-milking" or "calf-sharing" refer to the practice of leaving the calf with the cow part-time, so she can raise baby and you're sharing the milk with him, usually milking only once a day. There are many different ways to share-milk, and there isn't a "right way" or a "wrong way", as different things work for different people in different situations. There are some things that make the process a whole lot easier, though, so you just have to figure out what works best for you & your cow. This is the method that works best for me, and for many others who share-milk.

Separating

Most people like to separate the cow & calf for a period of time, to allow the milk to build up in the udder. How long you separate can depend on several things, including the age of the calf, the overall volume of milk the cow produces, and your own schedule. I generally leave the calf run with momma during the day, and separate them overnight, for about 12 hours. For the first couple weeks after calving when the calf doesn't take as

much milk, separating that long isn't only not necessary, it can be rather hard on the calf, especially in cold weather. So during that time, I only separate the calf for a few hours right before I want to milk, just to be sure baby doesn't "beat me to it". I need the calf to nurse during milking for the cow to let down her milk, so baby has to be hungry (more on this later).

Cow & calf are both more content during the separation if they can see & smell each other. I like to have the calf penned, with a gate between them that they can see and touch noses through. You can use a stall in the barn, or a small pen made of panels, etc. There is much less bellowing this way than if there is a solid door or divider between them & they can't see each other.

Milking Time

Share-milking works a whole lot easier if you use the calf to stimulate a let-down. Some people prefer to train the cow to let down her milk without the calf's help, but a lot of Dexters are "hold-up queens" and simply won't give you the milk. All it requires to induce a let-down is to allow the calf to nurse for about a minute to a minute and a half. You can restrict the calf to one or two quarters, as you like. Once let-down occurs, you have 10 minutes to get the milk out of the udder before the tap gets turned off. If it will take you longer than that, then you either need to use the calf again to try for a second let-down, OR milk out what you can first and THEN put the calf on part-way

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through to get the let-down.

So, here is how it plays out in my barn. In the morning, momma & baby are awaiting my arrival at the barn. I will go in the milking area & get things set up, pour feed in mom's trough, put the machine together if I'm using it, etc. This is the cow's cue to go to the bathroom, since my girls learn I don't approve of peeing & pooping in the milking area (yes, they can be taught that!). While mom takes care of business, I bring baby into the milking area. The calf gets haltered & tied at the front of the stanchion where mom can see & smell him, which helps to keep the cow happy.

Once everything is ready, I bring the cow into the stanchion. I clean up her udder & teats and then my hands, using disinfectant teat wipes. If I'm machine-milking, I'll hook the machine up to "my side" of her udder. I then untie baby, so he can nurse the other half of the udder for breakfast at the same time. If I'm hand-milking, I milk out what I can from "my side" first, then put the pail up out of the way, untie baby & let him nurse for a couple minutes on "his side" until mom lets down. Then baby gets tied up again, I clean my hands and mom's teats again & finish milking out my half of her udder. Once I'm done milking, baby is untied and allowed to finish his breakfast. With a very young calf that isn't emptying mom's udder yet, once he has gotten his fill nursing, I clean up the two teats he sucked, and finish milking

those quarters out the rest of the way. Using the calf to help like this, I'm able to get all the milk out of my half.

Everybody Leaves the Parlor Happy!

This has become my mantra. I want everybody to leave the milking parlor happy. I have milk to put in the fridge, so I am happy. Baby has a belly full of milk, so baby is happy. The cow knows she has done her job well, and more importantly, that her baby has had breakfast, so the cow is happy. This is a successful milking session!

I really like this method of share-milking for several reasons. The cow lets down fully & her udder can be cleaned out, which keeps the milk moving through the udder & helps prevent the risk of mastitis in higher-volume cows. By milking out one side of the udder after a 12-hour separation, I can get a very good estimate of my cow's total daily production (just multiply "my take" x 4). Once the calf can keep up with the cow's production, I can skip days, so I'm not tied down to milking every day. And of course, everybody leaves the parlor happy!

So, that is how share-milking works here at Hope Refuge Farm. It's one of the most satisfying things about owning Dexters, for me. Don't be afraid to experiment & see what works best for you & your Dexter cow.

Ugh, Is That a Vart? It probably is

Warts are extremely common in cattle and are caused by the bovine papillomavirus (BPV) and generally affect cattle under two years of age. Older cattle seldom have warts, likely because their immune system has developed the proper response by that age. The virus is highly contagious but it is species specific, so the virus that caused the warts on your cattle can't spread to humans, horses, goats, etc. Cattle are the primary carrier for the virus and it is usually spread by contact between cattle but the virus can also survive for extended periods of time on feeders, water troughs, halters, ear tagging equipment, etc. Due to the highly contagious nature of the virus, cattle with visible warts are generally not allowed in shows or sales with other cattle. It is important to know that by the time a wart is visible, that animal was initially exposed approximately two months prior to the growth of the wart.

Dr. Daniel Grooms, DVM, PHD, of the Michigan State University Large Animal Clinical Sciences Department states that there are six strains of the BPV affecting various parts of the body. They are:

- BPV1: Nose, teats, and glans penis

- BPV2: Head, neck, and brisket

- BPV3: Head, neck, and intra-digital

- BPV4: Bladder

- BPV5 & 6: Teat

BPV is considered self-limiting, that is, it will resolve itself on its own. Warts will disappear over time and the animal



will develop a proper immune response. Some publications state that once a wart appears, it can be removed by surgically cutting or crushing the wart; this may get more of the virus in the bloodstream

and initiate a quicker immune response. The Colorado Serum Company has a broad-spectrum wart vaccine which requires two injections subcutaneously along the side of the neck and a booster of the same within 3-5 weeks. However, you should be cautioned that this is a preventative vaccine according to the label and will likely only be effective prior to exposure.

Given this information, you have to decide the best course of action for your cattle. On our small farm, approximately 50% of calves under two years of age have had warts. We have never had any warts on cattle over two years of age. In our experience, the warts have resolved themselves within 3 – 6 months without scarring. However, you should always obtain advice and treatment from a veterinarian if you suspect that an animal with warts is exhibiting other problems that may or may not be related to the warts. In short, while warts aren't pretty, they are quite common and are usually nothing to be alarmed about.

Calving Preparation: What to have on hand to be prepared

I will start this by saying everyone's farm is different. There maybe items you will want to add, but this will give a good starting point. Also, most of these items you will never really have to use...and that is the goal, but in an emergency having these items on hand, in one designated spot will make life easier and less stressful in an emergency situation. I personally keep all mine inside a rolling tool box, it is easy to move around, and honestly sometimes emergencies happen in a hard to reach area. So being able to easily bring items to where you need them is key.

The most important item in to have it the phone number to your trusted vet. I keep both the regular hours and emergency after hours number clear tapped to the inside of the lid of my vet tool box, I also have both numbers saved in my cell phone. Next is to have a plan, know what area you want your cows to calve. Now cows are much like people and can go two weeks early or two weeks late but we have a generally good idea of when your animals should calve. I keep all my girls who are going to calve at about the same time in a group together in what I like to call. Y maturity pasture. This is a pasture that is closest to my house, and I can see the entire space from my living room windows. It also has a small 10x20 shelter that is open, but also has gates so in a pinch I can make stalls to lock them up, if needed.

Now back to the actual kit. In my kit I keep:

- Rope halter and neck rope. That way if the need arises I can easily halter the cow and mover her around.
- OB Chains. This is something we all wish to NEVER have to use, but a simple \$20 investment, will make things a bit easier if you ever have to pull a calf.
- A Cleaning Solution for both you and the back end of the cow, if you need to go in, it is best to have everything as clean as possible to lessen the risk of infection to the cow.
 - Rags or small towels
 - Injectable or Paste vitamins, selenium, and probiotics. There

are many different brands, some even that are a combination of everything use what works best for you, or what your vet suggests.

- An assortment of syringes (different dosing sizes) and needles
- I keep a few different antibiotics, but these are kept in the house since things like penicillin need to be kept cool. Also, some now require a vets prescription so have a good talk with your vet about why they suggest you keep on hand.
- Colostrum, either fresh (frozen from another cow) or a few powdered packets. If going the powdered route make sure they are A replacer NOT a supplement.
- A Calf Bottle with different size nipples. I keep both calf and lamb size nipples on hand.
- An extra pocket knife, because sometimes emergencies happen late in the night when we go out for a night time herd check in our pajamas.
- Baling twine, because it is the farmers McGiver tool. It can be used in a wide range of needs but can even be used to help pull a calf.
 - Scissors
 - Vet wrap

Now this isn't an item, but a rule of thumb I follow..." if my hand has to go in, she gets a shot of penicillin" we all try to be as clean as we can if we have to reposition or pull a calf, but to be safe a dose of penicillin is given.

Well now that you have a vet kit ready, and Lord willing you will never really have to use any of it, there isn't much left to do but wait. The saying a watched pot never boils, well the same is true for a cow. A watched cow never pops! Give them space, and watch from a distance. Dexters are an extremely hardy breed, that is known for their calving ease, so let them do it. It is hard, trust me I know. You have 9 months to anticipate the arrival, but giving the cow her space to do her thing is key. You do



not want to add any extra stress to her. Having a spot where you are out of the way, but can still keep an eye is key. Do not step in unless you must. I personally have a rule of if she is actively pushing, so final stages of labor, and nothing has happened in an hour, then I will go in and see what's up. Get the halter on her, tie her to a post, or get her in a pen, or put her in a head gate, clean yourself and her and feels what's going on, making sure the calf is positioned properly, then if need be help her get the calf out by pulling.

Pulling a calf is something most will never have to experience, but being able to stay calm and get the job done is key. The beginning of this summer I got to have my first pulling a calf on my own experience. I had done it in night school, 20 years ago, but it had never been my own animal. It was something I got to help with in FFA, as the schools farm manager. The cow was a well seasoned 11 year old, who has had 9calves with ease. I knew we were close and had my eye on her, well at the one hour mark from active labor I knew something was up. So I haltered her, put her into a stall and went in. The calf was positioned wrong, the muzzle was there but upside down and legs folded back.

(His feet were up toward the cows back) I will be honest it was an extremely scary moment, but by staying calm and keeping my wits, along with a guick phone call to the vet I was confident I could do it. He told me how to get the calf positioned and said to call him if I needed him. It took a bit of work, but by pushing the calf back a little and then working its legs up, he was finally in the correct position. I then wrapped the OB chains (something I have had for a while but never used) and helped the cow get him out. I wish I could say it was a happy outcome, but it wasn't for the calf. He sadly didn't make it, but by being prepared having everything I needed in one easy to get to spot the cow pulled through. In over 10 years of breeding Dexters I have never had to assist a birth till then, and yes I thought I was probably over prepared, but honestly I don't think you ever can be over prepared. Yes I have had to toss out an expired item or two that was never used, but to me an in emergency situations those items are worth their weight in gold. I can not stress the importance of having a kit together in one place is. As the saying goes prepare for the worst, but expect the best!

- Moving the AGM back one week would eliminate Salina next year due to prior facility commitment.

AGM will return to Salina in 2018 on the 3rd weekend in June.

The BOD felt that keeping future AGMs in the "bull's eye" of Dexter breeders and owners was best for the attendance of the membership. The 2017 AGM had 149 animals in the barn, 57 of which were sale animals, with 50+ youth show entries.

Discussion followed:

- Youth Director Plans- moving forward Elissa Emmons-Sawyer
- Canvass the youth what they want to see happen in the program.
- Jim Woehl listed Dexter clubs and suggested to start off by having a youth representative from each active regional and local group.
- It would be nice to have State Fair Dexter Shows with Breed Royalty representation
- A true Youth Committee needs to be established with procedure standardized in the SOP.
- Reduced Membership fee for Youth members

Family Membership fees currently include youth, an extra youth membership fee will not be required if the youth is part of a Family Membership.

A Proposed Budget Needs to Allow For:

- The IRS rule allowing for banked funds to cover operating expenses for a 9- to 12-month period.
- Expenses to operate the Youth Program need to be calculated and budgeted during the coming year.
- The need to improve software support

• Youth Heifer Programs

It was felt that the programs need to be clarified with requirements regarding animal transfers into youth name from the donating individual or organization.

• Show Money—Discussion on \$250/500

The SOP requires that all premium monies donated toward regional events be awarded only to ADCA registered animals. Allotments are \$250 for events with fewer than 25 animals and \$500 for those with more than 25 animals.

The SOP needs to be clarified to agree with information on the website.




- This is a contracted position, reviewed and renewed annually by the ADCA Board of Directors
